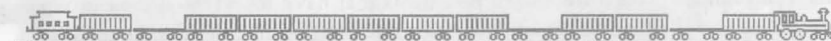

Summer has been busy at Descanso Gardens. Work on the International Rosarium and Iris garden renovation is, and has been intense. In July, Superintendent Steve Cohan talked with me about the official opening and dedication ceremonies of the International Rosarium (and Iris Garden), a week long event beginning May 13, 1994. Dr Cohan asked that the iris garden, a very visible part of this new area, not be barren when this important event takes place. Our solution is to pot the plants we acquire this fall (other than Trek-guest irises) and grow them in pots until the new beds are ready for planting (projected as late January) at which time they will be removed from the pots and planted in the prepared new beds. This will allow the Descanso irises in the storage area to remain completely undisturbed for the Spring Trek and to be dug at a more proper and convenient digging time - next summer - when we can count on summer intern help with digging, sorting and moving.

We are eagerly looking forward to next spring and the Region Trek because plants in the storage area are flourishing, and rebloomers there have provided enough continuous bloom throughout the summer to make each visit one of interest. To date, we have enjoyed bloom from ALTRUIST, AUTUMN HEIRESS, AMAIN, BEAUX ARTS, BLACK PEARL, BROTHER CARL, BUCKWHEAT, CENTENNIAL CHILD, CITY LIGHTS, CORN HARVEST, CLOUDLESS SUNRISE, CRACKEN, DOUBLE SCOOP, EARL OF ESSEX, ETERNAL WALTZ, IMMORTALITY, PAINTED VEIL, WINTERLAND and several others. There will be more; bloom stalks are visible on many as I write.

Descanso Gardens is located at 1418 Descanso Drive in La Canada, just off the 210 Freeway. Signs along the freeway and on the surface streets guide you to the gardens. Ask at the admissions gate house for the iris garden storage area location. D.I.G. volunteers are there every Tuesday morning until around noon. We will be happy to see you..

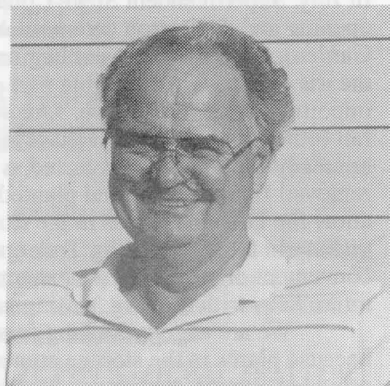


As one of the gardens on the '94 Spring Regional, Descanso Gardens will offer an early-bird preview of the iris area of the new International Rosarium and Iris Garden.

REGION 15 FALL MEETING PROGRAM SPEAKERS

Region 15 is fortunate to have two interesting and knowledgeable people to conduct judges training sessions at our Fall Trek and, in the case of Marky, act as our program speaker.

Marcia (Marky) Smith

Marky travels from her home in Yakima, Washington (Region 13), to serve as principal speaker at the Saturday luncheon and to conduct one of two judges training sessions to be offered at this year's Fall Meeting. Marky, who is currently serving as a director on the Board of the Siberian Iris Society, will conduct a judges training session on Siberian irises.

Raised on a ranch in the vineyards of Napa Valley, Marky later moved to Washington state where she has been a teacher, a landscape designer and a swim team coach. She is married to James L. Smith and they have two grown sons.

A multi-talented person, her diverse accomplishments include writing two books of poetry, one of which won the Pacific Northwest Writers Award for Poetry, and active participation in her partnership in the John Daniel Society, in Napa Valley, which produces Dominus, a premium wine. For the past decade Marky has been extensively involved in iris hybridizing. In 1992 she registered bearded irises for the first time, 18 in all.
