

Irisarians in the San Fernando Valley have deservedly been called "Shakers and Movers" <sup>1</sup> Your Region 15 Executive Committee met in "the Valley" on January 15 to begin service to you in 1994. Within 48 hours of that energy-charged meeting, Southern California and Region 15 were dealt a future which at this point in time could not be anticipated. While I am not suggesting that "the Board" is responsible for the Northridge Quake, I will suggest that they slow down a little 'til we get our feet securely under us.

I have been challenged, as many active members have, to justify membership in AIS.

"Why should I join the American Iris Society? What's in it for me?" And those who question are even more skeptical about the returns from participation at the region level. Have you heard such comments? Have you expressed them?

I believe that there are convincing arguments, positive answers which can change the negative climate in which this attitude is spawned. I pray that I can articulate these responses in words acceptable to the open-minded among you. Starting with this moment, and with every newsletter and region meeting of my tenure, I am going to try. (Elsewhere in this issue, find an outline of the Benefits of AIS Membership distributed to the members of a local group who were questioning their affiliation)

No "the Board" had nothing to do with the "shake, shake, shake" as my Granddaughter describes the phenomena, but "the Board" and irisarians, just like them, underscored by countless selfless acts, are the most important reason that I belong to the AIS and have agreed to pay some of my debt to you by agreeing to serve as your RVP.

I grew irises for 25 years before I discovered that there was an AIS affiliate in Southern California. Bobee and I visited an arts and crafts show. To our surprise, local irisarians were selling rhizomes. I don't remember that we bought cultivars, we had never had a problem finding sources for these. What we "bought into" was a community of friendly people.

Irisarians are one of our strongest support groups. After the temblor, it was next to impossible to capture a phone line into the quake area. It took amazing persistence or unbelievable luck to reach any of us in the San Fernando Valley. Yet, many of you tried, a few succeeded initially and we are still receiving expressions of your concern. We received multiple offers

to "move in with us", offers to bring water, diapers for our grandson, offers of dishes and glassware to replace our losses. One of you contacted our son and family in Reno, Nevada, because we could not establish a contact with them.

Yes, there is a price for these benefits. Among the costs may be the reasonable AIS and local dues, your presence at local meetings and AIS functions, a willingness to pitch in, the effort to introduce yourself, to extend greetings and exchange smiles. These, not-rhizomes, are the real currency of our fellowship.

The love of iris is the common denominator, the starting point in the relationship. Pay the total price tag above to receive the maximum bargain.



# AIS Region 15 Executive Board Meeting Minutes 15 Jan 1994

#### Attending:

Bill Rinehart, RVP Herb Holk, Asst RVP/Judges Train. Cal Bostwick, Treasurer Gail Barnhill, Sec./Tucson Area IS Jim Giles, Newsletter Ed. RVP Rinehart called the meeting to order at 9:30 am, welcomed and thanked all for coming. Attendees were paired off to "interview" each other and then asked to "introduce their partners from what they learned.

RVP Rinehart stressed his goals for the coming year of teamwork and democracy and the desire to conduct Region business by Committee. He noted that as Chairman, he will only vote to break ties. He then distributed a list of Region 15 Elected Officers, Appointed "Chairmen and Affiliate Presidents. (See front cover)

A copy of Region 15 Bylaws was distributed and RVP Rinehart asked everyone to review them later to see if we need to update our standing rules.

Individual Club Representatives gave reports of past and upcoming activities of their groups. RVP Rinehart asked everyone present to update their AIS calendars as events were announced.

Clubs were encouraged to include all other Club Presidents, Newsletter Editors, and Region Newsletter Editors on their newsletter mailing lists. Minutes of Oct 8th Exec Meeting were read, Bostwick Moved and DeSantis Seconded that they be approved as read. Motion carried. Minutes of the Exec and General Meetings of the 8-9 Oct 93 were read, Holk Moved and Monniger Seconded they be approved as read. Motion carried. The RVP noted that our Region Iris expenses were doubled as one Club requested funds early. Clubs are encouraged to request these funds in a more timely manner to avoid this "doubling" in the future.

Treasurer Bostwick also noted that a Fred Harris of the IRS told him in a telephone conversation on Nov 19, 93, that he felt since AIS is tax exempt and that we are part of the National organization, we are no longer required to file.

RVP Rinehart announce that a new region Committee position had been created for Awards at Treks. This will be Chaired by Jim Jones. RVP Rinehart suggested that Region 15 solicit donations for one of the awards we give at Spring Treks in honor of a Region 15 hybridizer. Troutman so Moved, Monniger Seconded. Motion carried. RVP Rinehart noted that since no Best Seedling by Region 15 Hybridizer was awarded at the last Spring Trek, we still have this available for the coming Spring Trek, thereby eliminating any award expenditures for this year.

In response to RVP Rinehart's query as to whether the Clubs would be interested in a seminar to share ideas for and ways of holding shows there was a consensus that perhaps such a session should be held at the Fall Trek.

On behalf of Judges training Chair Holk, RVP Rinehart distributed lists of Region 15 Certified Judges and Student Judges. He also distributed copies of responsibilities and duties for Apprentice Judges and Show Clerks. He urged Clubs to allow any Students they have to be Clerks at a show. He also encouraged Clubs to invite Region 15 Apprentices to work with the Judges at their shows, but noted that those Judges should be asked if they are willing to tutor those Apprentices first.

Membership Chair Shepard also proposed that Region 15 hold an AIS Membership Contest, similar to the one run by AIS. Barnhill Moved and DeSantis Seconded that Membership Chair Shepard design such a contest and implement it.

RVP Rinehart noted that the Newsletter job had been divided into two parts. The composition, layout and printing will be done by Newsletter Editor Giles, and the bulk mailing by Circulation Editor Sara Holk.

Newsletter Editor Giles asked for input as to when deadlines and publishing should occur. The consensus was: Feb 1 for Mar 1 distribution: May 1 for June 1 distribution; and Aug 1 for Sept 1 distribution. Editor Giles stressed the importance of prompt reporting to him of show and sale results as well as President's Reports. He further noted that he could accept information in Word Perfect, ASCII or Word for Windows formats on computer disks as well as pre-printed if so desired. After a short discussion regarding solicitation of paid ads in the Region Bulletin, Barnhill Moved and Troutman Seconded that this be allowed. Motion carried. Circulation Editor Holk will be responsible for solicitation of Ads. Circulation Editor Holk noted that we will be able to save money now that we have a bulk mail permit as the maximum cost of any mailing should not exceed \$125. She requested that Clubs send her updated membership Lists so that she can make mailing labels.

Youth Chair Webb noted we have a very limited number of youth members currently, but she is not aware of who they are in each club and asked Presidents to send her this information.

It was voted at the last Exec and General Meetings that Region 15 would purchase the pins for former Past RVP's who are still living. As the immediate past RVP, Bobbie Shepard will automatically receive the new Past RVP pin from AIS. RVP Rinehart asked for and received confirmation that those Past RVP's are as follows: Bob Brooks, Archie Owen, Lavern Conrad, Janice Chesnik, Eleanor McCown, Ralph Strane. Shepard will now order these pins for \$25 each from Region Funds. A consensus was reached that we would like to present these pins at the Spring Trek if possible.

RVP Rinehart adjourned the meeting at 3:25 PM.

## Trek Gardens a Celebration of April

A word about the four trek gardens on the '94 Region 15 Spring Trek. Three have been included on other Region 15 treks, and the fourth, a commercial garden is open to the public on a regular basis:

Furthest to the east in Altadena is the garden of George and Kay Sherman. The Sherman's are purchasing property adjacent to their present holdings and will increase the size of their iris plantings and improve the accessibility of the beds. Both George and Kay are instructors in art at the collegiate level and these improvements will reflect their experience and innate taste. Reluctantly, region gardeners admit that no one grows iris better than George.

Pairing with Sherman's is Descanso Gardens in La Canada. Again we are in the middle of a major overhaul. Irises will be more prominently featured as portions of the property are redesigned. While irises will be returned to the former locations, they will also line some of the pathways in the heart of the garden and a virgin location, quite near the front gate, will house the Descanso share of the guest irises. Those who know of Descanso as a forest of towering camellias under a canopy of spreading oaks, should be pleased to know that such a description is no longer adequate. A mini-tram will be a feature at this venue. Those who haven't discovered or rediscovered the new Descanso will have their opportunity.

The lunch stop will also be a refreshing discovery. The Rancho Cordillera del Norte (A.K.A. Northridge) is old ranch property in the Spanish tradition. It includes an authentic stage stop. It was also the home of the late Carl Dentzel, former curator of the Southwest Museum and is yet the home of his concert violinist widow. With luck some of their museum quality collections may be displayed for us.

The second major garden will be the Rancho de las Flores in Moorpark. Here a brand new commercial iris garden is being developed at the foot of slopes graced by an orchard of avocados. Hybridizers and commercial gardeners would love to have the growing conditions Mary Ann Spurlock enjoys.

To break the travel time between Descanso and Rancho de las Flores, it was important to add a fourth garden somewhere in between. That garden turned out to be Bill and Bobee Rinehart's. This is the third time that it has been on a region trek, yet those of you who have not seen it since the Joint Region 14/15 Trek of '90 will be pleased with some major landscaping changes.

Perhaps you have decided to pass in favor of Portland. Rather than denying Spring's obvious presence until late May, celebrate iris with us in the more appropriate April. You won't regret doing both.

There is definitely a West Coast bias operating. All but one of the 23 cultivars in the top twenty are of West Coast origin. Joyce Terry, the lone exception, is from Utah, also on the annual pilgrimage of California irisarians... Of the sixty four cultivars receiving ten or more votes, a total of seven were from other than regions 13, 14, and 15.

Only 96 AIS members in Region 15 submitted symposium ballots. There are almost that many AIS members in the San Diego/Imperial Counties affiliate alone....

## DESCANSO GARDENS

Descanso has had something...actually many "something's" blooming throughout the fall and winter of '93-94. We have never experienced such continual, and high quality rebloom in all the years since the iris garden was redone in 1985. Many, if not most, of the cultivars reblooming are varieties we had been growing at Descanso for some time, but which had not chosen to favor us with any off-season bloom prior to their temporary relocation the storage area in the fall of '92 to accommodate the rose-iris garden renovation work. Moreover, those few rebloomers that performed in the old iris garden area had never given us the flower quality and stalk quantity that we have enjoyed this year. Obviously, the storage area has nicely met the needs of many cultivars that have the potential to rebloom. This calls for some investigation, analysis and perhaps some re-thinking about what irises: are planted where.

Superintendent Steve Cohen is encouraging us to continue to utilize the storage area for growing irises even after the main iris display is replanted. It can serve as a "re-stock" area, as an area to nurse stock that needs special attention, to increase stock for landscaping in other parts of the garden, garden plant sales, and perhaps, as an area to observe and study reblooming habits and what factors most influence that trait at Descanso, or, for that matter, in Southern California.

Planting the iris-area section of Descanso's new international Rosarium is scheduled to start the end of February. When the word is given, hundreds of new iris cultivar waiting in pots will be taken from the storage area, tapped from their pots and planted in the display area by our small crew of Descanso Iris Garden (D.I.G.) volunteers.

With this important activity taking place concurrently with the equally important and very large job of getting the storage area groomed and ready for the SCIS hosted Region 15 Spring Trek, D.I.G. volunteers have a great deal to accomplish and we would be happy and grateful for any spare time individual Region 15 Irisarians might be able to offer us to help accomplish these tasks. Descanso Gardens is at 1418 Descanso Drive in La Canada, just off the 210 Freeway. Signs along the freeway and on the surface streets guide you to the gardens. Ask at the admissions gate house for the iris garden storage area location. D.I.G. volunteers are there every Tuesday morning until around noon. However, during this major activity period, you will probably be able to find D.I.G. volunteers at work in either or both of the areas any day of the week. We will be happy to see you.
