

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# ROP MESSAGE

The Executive Board of the American Iris Society has an opportunity at its 1996 Fall meeting in Colorado Springs to respond to serious concerns of the members of the society without a significant sacrifice of power. Whether the majority of the ruling body will accept the proposal of its peers or be unwilling to make any unforced surrender of authority only time will tell. Obviously, members of the Board will express their individual positions in various

terms and in differing degrees of acceptance of either extreme. Unfortunately, voting ultimately becomes yea or nay and polarity on the key issues was already present in Sacramento where the committee report was received and politicking in the interim is easily predicted.

In order to fairly assess the conflict certain issues need to be addressed. The spark that set the effort to draft a proposal in motion was an improperly conducted personnel appointment. Although the appointment was ultimately made in appropriate fashion the choice itself was never a popular one, and this sentiment was vigorously expressed. However, at no time was there a majority effort to set the appointment aside or as the original RVP action has been characterized was it an effort to get ------.

Secondly, it should be recognized that while the proposals made to the Board at Sacramento did come as the result of the request of the RVPs for the appointment of a committee, the proposals were not the product of the Board of Counselors (RVPs), but the results of considered deliberations of a committee appointed by the President of the American Iris Society. It should be noted that of the five committee members four were Board Members, one was the RVP representative as well, and the fifth was an RVP elect who is best known for considerable service in several sections.

The proposal deals with two issues: 1. restrictions on the terms of Directors and Ex-Officio Chairs; and 2. the granting to the personnel committee of the powers of a nominating committee and the change of the committee name to reflect the increased responsibility.

While acknowledging that the proposal is of greater length than what will be quoted, basically it proposes the following:"

### TERM LIMITS

- 1. AIS Directors shall be eligible to serve two three-year terms.
- 2. After completing two terms, a retiring director and
- 4. retiring Ex Officio chairs must be absent from the Board for one year before renomination.

### NOMINATING COMMITTEE

- 1. The name of the Personnel Committee shall be changed to the Nominating Committee and
- 3. Nominations for a second term as Director shall be at the discretion of the Committee."

Note that the Nominating Committee would have the identical makeup of the superseded Personnel Committee: 2 Directors, 2 RVPs, and 1 Section representative.

In summary, it is important to determine what power the Executive Board is being asked to release. First, if the proposal is accepted as presented the Board would no longer be able to nominate and elect themselves without reference to recommendations made by an appointed committee. Secondly, at some point the Board Member, whether Director or Ex Officio, would have to stand for election without the present advantage of incumbency.

To repeat- the proposal deals with terms of office and election procedures. It does not limit the ability of the Executive Board to make decisions in all other functions of the American Iris Society as at present. It gives no additional power to the Board of Counselors as such and any characterization of the proposal as an attempt of RVPs to transfer authority to themselves can not be supported.

I firmly believe that the moment is of such importance that it should be observed knowledgeably by all AIS members in the region where I have responsibility. And I as strongly believe that if the majority of the AIS Executive Board is not yet ready to take this small but inevitable step, that the issue will return again. Hopefully, in this future time members, RVPs, and AIS Board Members will remember 1996, work again within the system, and will treat the issues as positively and as professionally as have the Board Committee. I rise again to salute them.

### YOU'RE ABOUT TO MUTATE





The odd sound you may have heard coming from Southern Arizona on April 14th....was TAIS members' collective sigh of relief that the Region 15 Trek they hosted went off without any major, preventable disasters...after almost 3 years of work. One thing we could not control was, of course, the weather! Without having had much of a winter to speak of we seemed to go directly to summer so the iris were rather confused as to whether or not to perform. There are <u>still</u> some poor iris

out there trying to bloom in 105 degrees...it usually doesn't get that hot until late June or July.....ah, but it's a DRY HEAT, right?

Next on our agenda will be digging the Guest Iris for the Region Auctions which will be held in September this year....

Club Presidents: <u>PLEASE</u> notify me as to your <u>September</u> Auction date so we may send your iris in a timely manner! We had <u>many</u> Louisiana and Spuria Guest Iris this year in addition to Bearded iris...so also please let me know what <u>type</u> of iris your members might (or might **not**) be interested in bidding on. TAIS will hold it's Auction on September 7, 1996.

We are currently experiencing an epidemic of "shy" members as we are still without a Sale Chairman and our sale is approaching quickly...September 21-22.

Because TAIS was host to the Spring Trek they had no Show this spring.

### MISCELLANEOUS NOTES & RAMBLINGS:

I had a "new to me' disease outbreak this Spring - appeared as a leaf spotting of rusty colored fuzz (much like the spores on the underside of a fern frond) or possibly a scale disease - got progressively worse but did not appear to be spreading much beyond certain plant groups even tho there are others very close by - as it 'matured', shaking a leaf would release a shower of fine reddish dust - it was distinctly weakening the infected plants.

As -this is my <u>first</u> year without a spring application of CYGON, I tried ORTHENE insecticide to no avail. Finally on May 2<sup>nd</sup> I took some samples of both unaffected and progressively worse spotted leaves over to the County Dept. of Agriculture office. On the 11<sup>th</sup> I received a mailed report identifying the culprit as a rust caused by the fungus *Puccinia iridis*. This was followed the next day by a phone call - said it was pretty common this year due to the wet early season conditions but had not been reported on iris, - we discussed treatment - suggested using Ortho FUNGINEX (triforine) as I had it in use for my roses - two applications, 8 days apart, killed off the infection and plants are now in recovery.

A NICE service - especially as its entirely FREE!

Judges Kay Tearington, John Wright, LaDona Cypret, Gerry Snyder, and Dr. Ed Murray, plus apprentices Lynn Finkel and John Reinschmidt, did a very fine job of evaluating specimens. Unable to find Artistic Judges for that division, we still had adult and youth arrangements entered (and with expert advice from Irene Benton and Eileen Fuimara) the aforementioned panel of judges selected two Best Designs: Winners were:

Wini Conklin with "Duets", a twin container arrangement using "Emerald City" (IB), her favorite.(Adult winner).

Melissa Gilbert with "Breezy", using pastel iris of lavenders, pinks and white (Youth winner).

All judges concurred that AIS Judges should be trained in how to evaluate arrangements and that a Garden Club judge be included on the artistic panel. Iris must predominate and show schedule instructions be followed in the artistic designs!

### Weeds

You can always tell a true gardener from an impostor if you follow him in his garden. A true gardener is constantly swooping down pulling unwary weeds out of his garden like a shore bird plucking little creatures out of the sand. I tried imitating a true gardener one day. I was walking along with a friend in his garden when I spied a plant that looked very much like a weed I find in my garden called *Malva parviflora*; weeds have those fancy botanical names just like our prized plants. Well, I reached down to pluck it out when my ex-friend yelled at me 'DON'T TOUCH THAT" as he grabbed for his hoe to use on me, not the plant. It seems that many of the plants we call weeds have first cousins that some gardeners prize. I found out he had searched many catalogs for the seeds for this first cousin called "*Malva something-other-than-parviflora*."

Weeds come into our gardens in many different ways. Some lie dormant for many years waiting for you to scratch them to the surface and water them. Others are blown in from your non-gardening neighbor. Still others are brought in by our feathered friends. My own personal belief is that every rain drop of rain has a weed seed in it, because after the first rains of the season my garden is full of weeds. A gift plant is also suspect. That little nut-like thing hiding in the soil or a root that didn't belong there can take over a garden. It is a good idea to be alarmed if you see the words invasive or aggressive. I love horseradish on my roast beef so about ten years ago I bought a couple horseradish roots and thought how nice it would be to be able to go into the garden and pull out and grind some for dinner. I am still trying to free my tomato garden and petunias from it.

Every gardener has his personal collection of tools that he uses for weeding, the hoe being the most common. Weeders come in as many sizes and shapes as

gardeners do, with the new and different appearing on the market every year. My friend *Juaquine* at the Robinson Gardens let me use his favorite weeder while I was working there. He said that you can get one like it only in Mexico. It was shaped like a small sickle sharpened on the leading as well as the following edge so that you can cut off the weeds by pulling or pushing. I wanted to show it to you, but he caught me going out the gate.

There is another way of getting rid of weeds that I hadn't thought of. Caroline Sutherland was looking at the mounds of purslane growing between my rows of iris and very calmly said "Eat it. It's delicious.'

### 1996 REGION 15 SPRING TREK GARDENS - TUCSON, ARIZONA

### **KUTZ GARDEN**

It was still crisp and breezy when we began our tour of the garden of Melania and Tony Kutz. Here we found a large variety of desert and non-native plants and trees in addition to iris.

The iris beds were located outside as well as within a walled patio area and included some 200 varieties of tall bearded, some arilbreds and spurias. Most iris in this garden were mid-to-late season bloomers which we were too early for. However, Guest iris in bloom included SHERRYL RENE (Burseen '93) and a Holk seedling #2926A, and non-guests were MODERN CLASSIC, HOWDY DO,

CHARLES CASTLE, ROMIE STEWART and PUMPKIN PATCH, as well as MT. ST. HELEN, DREAM AFFAIR, DOVER BEACH, JOYCE TERRY, SNEAK PREVIEW and IMOGINE PEARL. The intriguing bloom of a horned arilbred, KALIFA'S HORN, was also admired.

Two rose beds were at peak bloom, and for added color the Kutz' interspersed plantings of linaria, pink and purple petunias, statice and godetia among the iris in the upper terraced area. Sweet

alyssum was used at the border, with tall pink "Rocket" snapdragons as background for the lower terrace iris. The swimming pool's floating flower fountain lent a cooling effect to what promised to be a warm Tucson day.

After being treated to a splendid breakfast buffet on the large porch, where a huge planter of Apple Blossom amaryllis was in full flower, we headed toward the second garden of the day.

### **HUFFMAN GARDEN**

Bill and Terry Huffman had quite a nice display of iris bloom for us. The Bearded Guest Iris were Seedling #38 (McCullough), APOLLO'S TOUCH (IB) (Nichols'91), COLORADO BONANZA (Magee '96), DESERT CELEBRATION (AB OGB-) (Flanagan '95), ENVOGUE (M. Dunn '92), FRENCH MELODY (Nichols '94), HALO IN ROSEWOOD (Niswonger '93), ICED TEA (Lauer '93), JOHN HOEHNER (Hoage '95), OPAL'S LEGACY (Hoage '93), PSHAW (Burseen '94), SPICED GINGER (Hamner '92) and STAIRWAY TO HEAVEN (RE) (Lauer '93). They also grow many Spuria and Louisiana iris but the only ones in bloom Trek Day were Don Shepard's Louisiana Guest Seedling labeled #89506 being

introduced this year under the name ARIZONA BIG RED, and one older spuria, JET SET (Williamson '75) which put in an appearance. The bloodlines of the "Mystery Iris"...QUIET FRIENDSHIP (Gaulter '90) in this garden obviously included PERSIAN BERRY (it's sib) as that was what most everyone guessed it was.

It was a delight to see quite a few Medians in bloom in this garden: RHINE MAIDEN (BB Magee '90), KIRSCH (BB

Burch '84), CHICKASAW SUE (BB Gibson '82), LITTLE MERMAID (IB Magee '92), and ALICE IN WONDERLAND (IB Maryott '83). Bill and Terry have recently begun collecting older iris and those putting on a show were: MISS CALIFORNIA (Salbach '37), MT. ST. HELENS (Craig '66), RED RULER (Craig '69), SUNDAY PUNCH (Crandall '77), SMOKE RINGS (Gibson '72).

Other garden treats were Terry's herb garden containing a bay tree, English lavender, thymes, marjoram, oreganos, burdock, red valarian ("Jupiter's Beard"), and hyssop, as well as two large ponds stocked with a variety of water plants as well as large goldfish and koi, and a cactus garden in the front yard containing both night and day blooming cereus cactus.

### **BESSEY GARDEN**

The Bessey's garden has almost 150 varieties of iris in the very front of the lot as well as about that many again in pots in the back yard. About 60% of the Guest Iris planted in this garden were in bloom: Seedlings #28 (McCullough), 3934 (Holk) and DNY-01 (Valenzuela), as well as newly introduced COLORADOAN (formerly Seedling 8713A) by Magee '96, and introduced Guests COALIGNITION (Burseen 93), COOL TREAT (Aitken 94), DANUBE WALTZ (Nichols '94), FROM A DISTANCE (Ernst '94), GRAPHIQUE (M. Dunn '94), HONEYMOON DANCE (Nichols '91), LACY PRIMROSE (Hoage '93), LADY JULIET (Nichols '94...reported to be a rebloomer), MOON LOVE (Magee '94), RAINBOW GODDESS (Ernst '94), ROYAL GORGE (Durrance '94), RUFFLED SKIRTS (Nichols '92), SHERRYL RENEE (Burseen '93), SKY BLUE PINK (Niswonger '94), SPEED LIMIT (Lauer '92) and THERESA LYNN (Hoage '95).

Paul, Fran and son Andy (who served as one of our bus captains) have a wide range garden styles sort of rolled into one: English design, Southwest overtones and

Xeriscape adapted plants! They have labeled most of the unusual desert and xeriscape trees and shrubs which was appreciated as of many us were unfamiliar with them. In amongst the iris in the front yard, and here and throughout there their gardens, were wildflowers as well as many familar annuals. Numerous nooks and crannies hid special gardens and projects.

special interest to many was a 3-4' deep sunken putting green lawn in the center of the back yard. The resulting "walls" made interesting resting and planting spots, and the 24-station automatic drip and sprinkler irrigation system sure fascinated and amazed a lot of folks!

### **TUCSON BOTANICAL GARDEN**

The "Dr. Raymond C. Allen Iris Garden" (named in memory of a former TAIS member and AIS Distinguished Service Medal Winner) at the Botanical Gardens included the following Guest Iris in bud or bloom: SPEED LIMIT (Lauer '92)), a good electric blue, FROM A DISTANCE and THINKING OUT LOUD (both Ernst '94), AZURE WHIR (Durrance '92), ATLANTA BELLE (Magee '92), BOOGIE WOOGIE (Nichols 93) SHERYL RENEE (Burseen 93), and seedlings #38 (McCullough), 5291A (Miller) and M87-1009K (M. Dunn). TAIS and TBG personnel had planted many annual and perennial wildflowers and native or desert adapted plants between the iris. A few of those in bloom were red flax, California poppy, Desert Bluebells (Phacelia), and various sages/salvias.

Both buses arrived here at the same time for a delightful box lunch. With many informal seating areas throughout the Garden, we were able to wander where we pleased to eat. We had a little more time to spend here than at our other stops, and some of the interesting displays we saw included a Tropical Garden (in a Greenhouse), a Sensory Garden, Herb Garden, Butterfly/Bird Gardens, as well as Cactus and Succulent gardens, and

Composting displays.

### **DUNNIGAN GARDEN**

There are so many "micro climates" in Tucson that it was bound to happen! Greta's front garden included 25 bearded Guest Iris...which weren't quite ready to bloom - with the exception of Dick McCullough's seedling #22...and her backyard Arilbred garden was just finishing up! However, we did get to see Flanagan's Guest Arilbreds (all OGB-): DESERT SPIRIT ('94) in full bloom with 4 stalks; DESERT JOY ('95) still with one bloom stalk; DESERT FESTIVAL ('95) had two stalks still in bud. A non-Guest Arilbred, CHILD OF GOD (Hunt/McAllister '85) was sporting 5 bloom stalks.

Even without a mass of iris to view, we enjoyed Greta's desert landscaping and saw how colorful a low water use garden could be. All of the wildflowers, native and desert adapted shrubs and trees, were in full bloom in both the front and back gardens. All in all, a very enjoyable garden visit.

### **DETWILER GARDEN**

Our garden host, Bert Detwiler, does not have "a garden". He has a "floorplan of garden rooms" and specializes particularly in Louisiana Iris...a treat to see on a Trek! As the bus arrived at this stop, a voice was heard yelling "that's my baby!" "Baby",

of course, it was Pete DeSantis' purple TB seedling #85-26 with eight 46" stalks in full bloom.

Eight tubs containing Guest Iris lined the path from the street and into a side garden "room" where two huge clumps of the lovely species-looking spuria BELISE was in bloom. Other plants in bloom near the entry were red yuccas, oleander trees, and a massive magenta bougainvillea ("Barbara Karst"). Bob Dunn's purple seedling B89-1098A was looking good and had been blooming since January 24th according to our host, plicata and Mary Dunn's prim GRAPHIQUE drew praise as did COLORADAN (Magee '96).

In the patio "room" we saw several Louisiana including Guest iris SOUTHDOWNS (O'Conner 93), with

large flat ice-blue petals, and in the back garden "room", dubbed "Garden of the Koi Grotto" CREOLE FLAME was in bloom in front of the kidney shaped koi pond, home of a metallic yellow 24" Ogon koi.

The side garden "room" contained Louisianas at either end with TBs and Spurias in the middle. Guest Louisianas in bloom included a maroon test seedling #83-5A

(DeSantis), KITCHEN MUSIC (a Morgan seedling) a striking bi-color of rich brown and tan, HEATHER PRIOR (Taylor '93) with cream standards veined and flushed pink, falls similar but heavier pink effect, RICH JEWEL (Morgan 95) and the near black beauty EMPRESS JOSEPHINE by Haymon (90) which was ruffled and luxurious. Other iris in bloom below the Thompson grape vine were Louisianas BOB WARD, PROFESSOR NEIL, MAC'S BLUE HEAVEN, PRESIDENT HEDLEY and ACADIAN MISS, TOP NOTCH, DR. DORMAN, BOLD CAJUN and GLOWLIGHT (dark blue falls under pale blue standards.)

In what Bert calls his "secret garden room" which is hidden behind the back fence, was another planting of Louisianas in mostly shade. The small blue LAKE OACHITA as well as PRALINE FESTIVAL, E.C. EVERINGHAM and FRANK CHOWNING were eye catchers here.

### BARNHILL GARDEN

If you've heard the term "obsessive/compulsive" before, then you can understand Gail Barnhill's garden! She not only has about 300 iris on the outer edges of each of

separated several beds wandering paths, but has planted just about every known annual and perennial plant that can take the Tucson weather in the center of these beds - thereby creating her goal of an English Country Garden - in the desert no less! Gail must like doing things the hard way! She said she's especially proud of the fact that everything we saw in her yard was planned, planted, dug and designed over only the past 8

years (you should seen the "before" picture she showed us)... by Gailpower...with supervision by faithful Gardendog "Odie".

Guest Iris in bloom were COLORADAN (Magee '96), ICED TEA (Lauer '94), HONORARIUM (B. Dunn '94), COLORADO BONANZA (Magee '96), QUEEN BEE (BB) (M. Dunn '94) and TB Seedling #2928 (Holk). The "Mystery Iris" in this

garden - HARLOW GOLD (IB) - apparently wasn't such a mystery as many participating in the contest guessed it easily. (Maybe they figured out Gail's iris are planted alphabetically?!) Other iris in bloom were JESSIE'S SONG, PAGAN, COSMIC SUN, SINISTER, WELCOME ABOARD, ASK ALMA (IB), and TRICK OR TREAT. Gail also grows many arilbreds, spurias and louisianas now, however none were in bloom for the Trek.

A few of the other plants garnering the most comments were Watsonia, (I saw Terry Aitken standing next to one of these with a shovel and a sneeky look....!) foxglove, both Queen Anne's Lace and it's look-alike Bishop's Weed, "killer" nasturtiums whose leaves were so big they looked like lotus leaves, sweet peas, larkspur, statice (german), heliotrope, columbine, and several types of hybrid oxalis, Shirley poppies...as well as the, ahem, "other" kind of poppy, and forget-me-nots to name just a few. Five ponds ranging from inground to 1/2 barrel mini-ponds are home to several types of water fauna... giant goldfish (each with a name!), a red slider turtle, resident frog and possibly a crawdad(!), and flora... I. pseudacorus, I. lavagata varigata, taro, water lilies, pickerl rush weed, dwarf papryus and cattail.

Trekie Carol Morgan noted that "Gail probably has too much spare time on her hands" when she spotted one of Gail's fancy-schmancy labels...which included not only the common name but also the botanical name for...a very well grown Dandelion! Scheesch...is that obsessive/compulsive, or what? Fun to see such a passion in action!

### **JUDGES TRAINING**

Now that the bloom season is over there only remains two things to be done—vote the symposium and submit your Activities Report. Remember that your Activities Report must be submitted no later than 1 August 1996.

A two-hour session on AWARDS AND BALLOTS will be conducted at Cal-Dixie, 14115 Pear St., Riverside, CA on July 14 beginning at 1:30.

In the coming year it is suggested that the local societies endeavor to offer more Judges Training than was offered in 95-96. After all, judges training is the best way to learn about irises whether or not the individual intends to become a judge. Also we need to recruit more student judges as it is difficult to obtain sufficient judges for the shows when situations arise such as the one this year with Region and National coming in the same month—judges just can't be in two places at the same time.

We know that we have many members who would be good judges, so if you are interested in becoming a judge, please let us know and we will be delighted to send you the necessary forms and information to help you get started—"TIME WAITS FOR NO MAN." So don't put off until tomorrow that which will help you become better informed about your favorite flower today.

RVP Rinehart called the meeting to order at 9:32 am at his home in West Hills, California. He then distributed lists of the 1996 Region 15 Officers and another of the Region 15 Affiliate Presidents names, addresses and telephone numbers. (Exhibit A).

<u>Minutes</u>: The Minutes of the October 21, 1996 Executive Committee Meeting will be published in the Spring Region Newsletter and reviewed for approval at the April 13, 1996 meeting.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

<u>Awards</u> Chairman Jones said he has a cost for the Best Out of Region 15 Guest Iris Award plaque: \$92.55 for the first one and \$73.07 for the second. This price may drop if we have several made up at once. It was **MOVED**, **SECONDED** and **CARRIED** that Chairman Jones go forward with the purchase of 10 of these plaques. It was further **MOVED**, **SECONDED** and **CARRIED** that this Award be named the "Claire Barr Award for Best Out of Region Guest Iris".

Judges Training Chairman Holk said we have 5 Apprentices who are coming up on their three year requirements and urged the club presidents to ask their show chairmen to invite the Apprentices to work with their show judges. He also asked that when we recruit members to participate in Judges Training, that we try to be sure they are truly interested in entering the program. Chairman Holk noted that the Judges training sessions to be held at the Sacramento Convention will not be staggered this time but will only be 1.5 hrs. vs. 2 long so that people may be able to attend more than one session. He reminded us that we must request approval from him in advance of any training programs we want to sponsor and then send him a copy of the sign-up sheet (non-students do not sign this) after the event. The instructor has to administer written tests with a minimum of 20 questions to be completed at the end of the training session. These tests need to go the Region Judges Training Chair, along with a blank copy of the test which our Chair will forward to the AIS Chair. A list of Active Judges and Apprentices for 1996 was distributed, along with AIS Judges Training Applications, instructions and Handbook Exams.(Exhibit B).

Membership RVP Rinehart announced that Membership Chair, Bobbie Shepard has resigned this position and that Sara Holk has agreed to complete her term. RVP Rinehart further noted that AIS lost a total of 1287 members in 1995, but also gain 1200, so membership is steady (currently 8194). Region 15 currently has more AIS members than any time since 1987 - 533, which made Region 15 the 5th largest in AIS for 1995. (Exhibit C). RVP Rinehart said AIS has changed its membership

system so that all dues will renew in December. Those who currently pay dues in June will get six month "free" in order to convert them to the new system. A letter from AIS in this regard (and which includes the new AIS dues rates) was distributed (Exhibit D), as well as a list of those Region 15 AIS members whose dues are currently listed as delinquent (Exhibit E).

<u>Newsletter</u> Chairman Giles stated the next newsletter deadline is 2/1/96 for publication 3/1/96. The deadline after February will be 6/1/96. RVP Rinehart said that if Affiliate Show Chairs get their Show Report to him, he will forward a copy to Chairman Giles for the newsletter.

<u>Youth</u> No report. RVP Rinehart asked that Affiliates continue to mention Youth Membership at their meetings.

### **AFFILIATION**

<u>Affiliation Reports</u> These are due to RVP Rinehart today, and should include a copy of the Affiliate Membership Lists and their Check if their AIS Affiliation is below the minimum.

### **SPRING & FALL MEETINGS**

Progress Reports TAIS President, Barnhill, distributed copies of the Spring 96 registration forms, which have a greatly reduced registration rate of \$25 due to the excellent fund raising efforts of their membership (Exhibit F). San Diego is still in the planning stages for the Fall 96 meeting but nothing definite to report yet; SFVIS will host the Spring 97 meeting at the Burbank Hilton, April 5-6-7, 1997; Hi-Desert is just beginning to plan for the Fall 97 meeting; Orange County reported that they would have to decline hosting the Spring 1998 meeting as they simply don't have enough gardens located close enough together; San Diego said they have the same problem and won't be hosting the Spring 99. Both OCIS and SDIS would not have problems hosting Fall meetings however. It was noted that Fall meetings do not have to be more than 1 day long, but many prefer to have an opportunity for more Judges Training sessions such as is done in a 2-day event. RVP Rinehart stated we will continue with the "Meeting Wheel" through 1997 and will immediately work on finding a Spring 98 host. (Exhibit G)

<u>Trek Guidebook</u> RVP Rinehart pointed out that page 23 regarding Region 15 Iris Purchases for Auction in the Guidebook will need to be deleted and that the new Claire Barr Award name be included in the section on Awards.

Also it was agreed that the Guidebook should include the statement that it is customary that the host club pay for the RVP's room and to contact the RVP to make such arrangements.

<u>AIS Sacramento National Convention</u> While it is up the individual affiliates and whether or not they can afford it, RVP Rinehart recommended the affiliates try to compensate their presidents for some or all of their Convention expenses.

**REGION AUCTIONS** After discussion it was agreed that the affiliates will now hold their Region Auction meeting in September. This will allow the host of the Spring meeting to divide the guest iris in August which should result in more rhizome growth/increase as well as better planting weather. OCDIS request they not be sent any Auction iris this year, and SDIS asked for only 1/2 the normal shipment of iris.

**EXHIBITIONS (SHOWS)** RVP Rinehart stressed that the affiliate show chairs send their proposed show schedules to AIS Exhibition Chair, Lillian Gristwood, ASAP, as they need to be approved by her prior to printing/show date. RVP Rinehart also needs to know show dates. Further, be sure your show chairs send her their show report, with a copy going to RVP Rinehart.

FINANCES Treasurer Turner distributed copies of the Region 15 Balance Sheet report (Exhibit H). After review and discussion, it was MOVED, SECONDED and CARRIED to approve forwarding this report for audit. It was further MOVED, SECONDED and CARRIED that all RVP funds be put into one CD and each year just before it rolls over, take out the maximum of \$700 for RVP expenses for that year. It was also MOVED, SECONDED and CARRIED that \$1,000 be moved from the regular checking account into the RVP account.

<u>1996 Budget</u> After review and discussion, it was **MOVED**, **SECONDED** and **CARRIED** that the following 1996 Region 15 Budget be approved (Exhibit I).
