bloomed in the snow during the National at Denver. That was a first for me-to see the iris peeking through the snow and realize just how hardy they really are. The Nationals are always interesting, but most importantly we have an opportunity to visit with irisarians all over the country and you always learn something useful.

The affiliate shows were all very successful and the affiliates are all operating in the black a most successful year. Congratulations to all!

Whether it seems right or not, the iris year starts now. The bloom next spring depends primarily on this falls growth-so get them planted as soon as weather permits and keep the ground moist until they get their roots down.

The Inland Region Iris Society will host the Region fall meeting at the Ontario Holiday Inn in Ontario California. The Board meeting will begin at 8 a.m. and will be followed by judges training at 10 a.m. The General meeting will be at 1:00 p.m. This meeting will be an important one because the general membership will be asked to approve or reject the proposed constitution, which was enclosed with the Summer NEWSLETTER. After approval by the membership it will then go to AIS for their approval after which, its passage will give the Region an opportunity to move forward toward becoming a legal non-profit organization. We hope that even if you are unable to stay for the whole meeting that you will come and be a participating part of the general meeting. It is my understanding that we will have one of the lowest registration fees in years. I am looking forward to seeing many of you who were unable to attend the spring meeting. You are important to us and your attendance will be appreciated.

Our 1999 Spring Trek will be a joint meeting with Region 14. It will be hosted by Region 14 and will be held at the Radisson Hotel in Visalia. our most recent information from George Sutton, Trek chairman, gives us a tentative schedule as follows: The meeting will begin on 16 April (Friday) with the Region Boards meeting at 7:30 p.m. The general meeting will be held at 7:15 on April 17; following which we will board buses and tour four gardens and return to the hotel by 5:30 p.m. for a no-host cocktail hour and banquet. On Sunday there may be a tour into the local mountains to see PCNs in their natural habitat. Registration will not exceed \$50. Ray Schreiner will give two hours of judges training. Hopefully there will also be garden judges training at Suttons on Sunday, April 18th. (If you haven't been to Sutton's Green Thumber, you are missing a real treat!)

A reminder-Region 15 needs judges. Anyone interested should contact Gail Barnhill, Region 15 Judges Training Chairperson, to obtain application blanks and additional information as to the requirements to become a judge and the obligations you assume by doing so.

And our rhizome sale will be held in a mail in October. We really got tired of baking ourselves in the heat. A mall might allow us to consider a 1 day sale instead of our usual 2 half days. It's been a productive year in Judges "trainingville". Lots of interesting classes were offered throughout the Region and at the Denver Convention (where many of us had the opportunity for the most unusual training of "Evaluating Iris Bloom in the Snow"!!) and our judges and students eagerly attended them.

As this is being written, it appears there will be lots of movement within the ranks. We may have one first year Student qualify for Apprenticeship, and both of our current Apprentices should advance to Accredited Garden Judgeship. This coupled with losing some Students, will unfortunately leave our "up and coming" ranks VERY slim. Four of our Accredited Judges should advance to Master status this year and two Active Masters have requested Retired Master status.

I thank all of you who were so thorough and prompt in returning your Activity Reports. The thoroughness makes my job easier and the timeliness ensures your continued judges status. Unfortunately, at this time I'm still missing about 7 Reports (3 Students and 4 Accredited Judges) and may be forced (by Region rules) to drop these judges from the program. This is really sad, as the Report should be the easiest responsibility of your judgeship to fulfill! I've had several judges' comment that the page I sent them to insert in their Handbooks this spring really made the job of keeping track of their training throughout the year much easier. Since a judge/student must take their Handbook with them to training classes, and this "log sheet" is the first thing you see when you open your Handbook, it is a simple matter of writing down the class info as soon as you sit down.

Speaking of Handbooks...the new revised books were available for the first time at the Denver Convention and as those in the program are required to have the current edition, the Handbook Sales table did a very brisk business! If you didn't get your new Handbook at the Convention, remember you are required to do so as soon as possible. Even if you're not in the Judges Training Program, this Handbook has value in helping you understand just what the judges are looking for at shows and in the garden...so order yours now (see AIS Storefront ad in any AIS Bulletin).
