#### **RVP** Message

For those of you who attended either or both the Spring Trek and/or the National Convention I am sure you will agree that they were memorable occasions. In both, the weather was the only problem and none of us can

ontrol that Anyhow, congratulations to Sun Country and thanks to their trek commence for a job exceptionally well done.

At the Region 15 Board meeting the principle item of discussion was changes to the proposed constitution and by-laws. One of the proposed changes was to limit appointed committees and their chairpersons to a three-year term just as the elected officers are. The other was to allow committee chairpersons to vote on matters brought before the Board.

Prior to the Region meeting the RVP had received a letter from the AIS stating that the region could become a tax-free organization under the sponsorship of AIS if it so desired. Both the Board and the general membership authorized the RVP to submit the necessary documentation. This has been done however, much remains to be done.

At the AIS board meeting in Denver, Dr Epperson reported that the Regions could allow the affiliates in their regions to become tax-free organizations under the Regions sponsorship providing the affiliates change their constitution and by laws to meet the federal requirements. This also means that each affiliate will have to incorporate

individually. We are now attempting to obtain information as to the items, which must be included in the affiliate constitutions in order to meet the federal requirements.

Another item of interest in the AIS board meeting was the discussion concerning the request of the Tall Bearded Iris Society that they be granted cooperating society status as enjoyed by the LSI and the Aril Society. A great deal of discussion on this point followed, wherein the AIS expressed a willingness to accept the TBIS as a section but not as a cooperating society. Further discussion of this point will occur at both the Region and the AIS Fall board meetings.

Please make plans now to attend the Fall meeting, which will be hosted by the Inland Region Iris Society. We need as many as possible in attendance in order to pass the proposed new constitution and by-laws and to elect officers for the coming year. We also welcome those AIS members who are members of local clubs, which are not affiliates of AIS.

A copy of the proposed constitution and by-laws is included in this NEWSLETTER for your perusal. If you have any suggested changes, please send them to me or call me at (909) 780-0335 so that they can be brought before the board.

Our club trek on 11 April would have had better participation if we had had less precipitation, but a good time was had by all who took part. Our show two weeks later had better luck, and was quite a success—see the show report below. We even sold enough potted iris to cover all the show expenses.

Our May speaker was Barry Blyth, who gave a very well received program. The June meeting included a potluck dinner, presentation of show awards, and election of officers. The four incumbents were reelected: president—Gerry Snyder, vice-president—Jeanne Clay Plank, treasurer—Roy Bossier, and secretary—Jill Bonino. July will feature a slide show of recent treks given by Jill Bonino, and in August and September we will have our Region 15 and club auctions.

#### **SFIS SHOW RESULTS**

Many of us hurried back from the Regional in Phoenix to get ready for our Spring Show-"A CIRCUS PARADE OF IRISES". Although we were not at peak bloom, we did pretty well. We had 24 exhibitors bringing in 192 entries, plus 20 Seedlings coming in from 4 of our members and about 3 dozen specimens decorating our Exhibition table.

Starting at the top of the HORTICULTURE DIVISION, The Silver Medal went, again, to **Jean Bossier** with I Blues. The Bronze Medal went to **Peter De Santis.** These two are always the ones to beat.

The Queen of Show was won by **Jean Bossier** with an *IB-Banded Butterfly*, proving again that Tall Bearded's don't always win. Ten Section awards were given out.

Jean Bossier took the Section Awards in TBs-Gold Country, BBs- Whoop-em-up and Lag-Banded Butterfly.

Mary Ann Spurlock also took 3 Section Awards with MTBs-Rosemary's Dream, SDBs- Leprechaun's Delight and LA -Acadian Miss.

Don Cunningham-Novelty TB - Apollo One, Jan Lauritzen-ABs- Shariffa, Pete De Santis-SPU - Proved, and Peggy Carpenter-SIB-Smooth Seas.

The Best Seedling award went to Randy Squires' TB. In All 27 Blues, 51 Reds, 44 Whites and 26 HMs were awarded.

In the ARTISTIC DIVISION, 48 Designs graced the tables by 17 Designers. Long time member Helen Zeldin won the *Advanced Section* Award, which enabled her to walk away with her first Best Design of Show. Way to go, Helen. The *Intermediate Section* Award went to Norma Noraval and the *Novice Section* went to Penny Iriye. Both of the Artistic *Sweepstakes* and the *Theme Award* went Eileen Fiumara.

In all there were 17 Blues, 14 Reds, 8 Whites and 9 HMs.

A bit of FVI for all of you out there who are N. selling irises at your Spring Show. For the past 4 years, SFVIS has been selling "potted irises" to the public. We have found that it works really great. We take the "little bitty ones" from the Fall Sale, baby-sit them over the winter and "ta-da" great sales. It has grown into a sale that almost pays for the spring show.

Our publicity chairperson, Ruth Over and husband Frank, managed to get TAIS a full page write up, complete with pictures, in the Sunday newspaper the Sunday hore the show, and the public came in groves! #### Betty Howard Garden

As you approach this garden you are met by a neatly xeriscaped front yard which very appropriately addresses the Spanish influenced architecture of the house. A most interesting feature is a "topiary" juniper clipped, rather than in "puffballs", into "Puff-boxes". Quite eye-catching.

On your way to the back garden you pass a very cool and tropical looking entry-atrium, lushly planted with ivy, ficus, Monterey Pine, Iron cross Oxalis, rapholiphis, and then through the hallway carport with a mural on the

stucco wall to your left, and a vigorous Climbing Blaze rose on your right.

In the back garden a swimming pool angles off to your right. This is backed by light pink, highly fragrant, Climbing Cecil Bruenner roses with brilliant pink petunias at their feet, as well as iris -CHIEF HEMATITE, SPLASH OF BLUE, looking very good, PINK UNICORN, an older horned iris, and BEACH GIRL by Barry Blyth putting on a good show. Also beginning to bloom were ETERNAL PRINCE, WHITE STALLION and SILENT PATRIOT.

The left two thirds of the backyard is dedicated to a crisply green winter rye lawn shaded by a large elm and a citrus. Spaces between the Oleander against the wood fencing contained clay pots of daffodils. This part of the

garden is accented by colorful spot and edging flower gardens. One "spot" garden "contained (?I?)" the much admired SCHOONCHEE by Pete DeSantis (later awarded the Best Introduced Iris by a Region 15 Hybridizer at the Banquet), which was blooming its heart out as it had in all other gardens seen this weekend. This small bed also had another of Pete's iris in bloom, seedling 85-3, a promising bicolor with ecru standards and lavender falls. This bed was ringed with purple petunias that complimented these iris extremely well.

The left side contained many very healthy looking roses, more citrus trees as well as most of the Guest Iris. Guest iris in bloom were both Charles Jenkin's spuria ELFIN SUNSHINE, a dainty light yellow and white (later awarded Best Spuria), and Richard Richard's very promising TB seedling 6005,, a deep purple with lighter hafts giving it a "glow" (later awarded Best Seedling by a Region 15 Hybridizer).

This was a lovely garden <u>Just</u> on the cusp of peak bloom ... wish I would have revisited it the following weekend as well.

On the comer, the iris bed was highlighted by two Hamner cultivars, the red-violet PRINCESS GLORIA, and TWICE BLUE, a neglecta. Two newer varieties FLIGHTS OF FANCY a Keppel luminata and MARIPOSA SKIES a midblue from Rick Tasco were equally impressive.

rside the gate a grape arbor which had provided seating for the national was now a stage with footlights of glowing dianthus providing the focus for the theatre seating of the A to Z commercial stock. Starring in this

production in order of appearance were: SMILING GOLD, Rick Ernst's gold and white. SILKEN SHADOWS a neglecta from Bill Maryott which somehow had not come to my attention until this year and which has been good in several venues, RUFFLED GODDESS an orchid favorite in my home garden, the progeny of Rick Tasco, Schreiners amoena RIDE THE WIND which can be an impressive clump, and PACIFIC DESTINY the very floriferous blue-violet from Larry Lauer.

At the next portal I was carded by a bevy of white doves and became eligible for a refreshing cocktail of lemonade. Not yet sure of the "thick trunks" reference, I avoided the other refreshment on the attractive terrace and rounded the corner to check out the evolution of what I had remembered as a very attractive shade garden highlighted by four connecting ponds.


The shade is even deeper now and the word association response would have to be restful. Beautifully appointed in psuedacorus, equisetum, papyrus, fern and garnished with water lilies and water hyacinths, the ponds are home to kei and goldfish. The paveloping walls are hung with an assortment of visually and acoustically correct vines not the least of which is a tassel of variegated ivy.

The years and the Karys have dealt kindly with this garden. It is that rare blend of showcase and lived in.

## SHEPARD IRIS GARDEN

An expansive garden in a quaint, neighborhood setting surrounded by grandfather pines and bottle trees was what I found at Shepard Iris Garden. Thousands of

In my estimation, about five hundred of the dancing, white blooms filled the front bed. Many other varieties bloomed in profusion including NOREEN'S DELIGHT, Shephard's 1998 large ruffled introduction of white violet standards and dark violet falls. Adjacent to the garden in a distant vista is a menagerie of sheep, goats and donkeys and to the rear is an absolutely adorable country barn made in the finest of woods. A lovely lawn area filled with picnic tables and a shady patio provide another spot to fill one's soul with all the beauty about him. There in the center of the lawn is a large pond home to gold fish and water loving iris, pseudacorus and Louisiana and water lilies.

But one can't stop here for more than half of the garden is yet to see in the back through a garden behind another row of huge trees. This large rowed garden is filled with 300 spurias, 100 Louisiana's, more bearded iris and thousands of Don's seedlings.

Before leaving, one can discover the most exquisite and amazing bed of Louisiana iris to the left of the main house. Blooming in abundance was MARBLE CAKE and NAVAJO ROSE, Shephard's introductions for 1998. I must tell you that I feel in love with Louisiana iris after filling my vision with these two heavenly cultivars. It was time to go too soon and I couldn't take my eyes from these large plants of substance and grace that grew under a huge deciduous tree. What a treat before leaving the garden that will fill my memories for the year to come. Thank you Don and Bobbie for sharing all this splendor in such a warm and friendly country setting!

# The Marge Larson Garden



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
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#### **JUDGES TRAINING NOTES**

RVP Holk called the meeting to order at 3:15 PM.

**Minutes:** The minutes of the January 17, 19.3 Executive Committee Meeting were read and approved.

\*t was MOVED, SECONDED AND CARRIED to approve the minutes.

Treasurer's Report: In Treasurer Michelle Snyder's absence, Gerry Snyder provided a 2 page report as of 3/24/98: General Fund Checking account balance of 9,441.90, balance in CD of 5,997.64, resulting in a Total General Fund of \$15,433.54. The RVP fund has \$5,315.42. The Officers' Fund shows a separate balance for each officer, but no fund balance (which is \$978). (EXHIBIT A)

G. Barnhill requested that the Officers' Fund be noted as a separate accounting within the general fund, with a beginning and ending balance shown for the entire Officers' Fund. It was MOVED, SECONDED AND CARRIED to do so, with the report to be filed for audit.

Judges Training: Chairman Barnhill reported that we lost 2 retired judges, but have gained 5 new student judges: Steve Rocha, Sharlyn Rocha, Cathy Chilton, Jane Parks and Barbara Evans.

Judges training topics by Region 15 this past year in-luded: Color/form, tall bearded, and Space Agers. Valso need to offer more training in Arii/Ariibied, Siberian and Louisiana.

Youth: Chairman Monninger is working on letters to invite youth to participate. He welcomes ideas on youth recruitment to AIS and Region 15.

Rhizomes: Chairman Rinehart reviewed that in 1999, Region 15 will join with Region 14 to offer a Spring Trek in Region 14. Since Reg. 15 will not have guest iris, he will buy new rhizomes (1999) for Reg. 15, as well as rely on the generosity of Reg. 15 members to donate "new rhizomes" (1995 and newer). He will contact club presidents later this year.

Membership: In the Membership Chairman's absence, RVP Holk reported that we had 442 members as of April 15, 1993. This was a net loss of 47 members from our fall report. Affiliates were thanked and encouraged to continue with their recruiting efforts, and to encourage youth to participate.

Newsletter: Chairman Giles requested that Spring Show reports be sent to him. Personalized reports are fine. Giles asked for volunteers to write up the 6 "lens" at Spring Trek in Phoenix for the newsletter.

Volunteers and "their gardens" are: Steve & Sharlyn Rocha (Shepard's); Gail Barnhill (Howard's); Bill

Rinehart (Kary's); Jim Giles (Larson's); and Pete DeSantis (Wickenkamp's).

Way & Means: Chairman DeSantis encouraged affiliates to have special sales of Rhizomes for the Officers' Fund. RVP Holk again this year offered to provide rhizomes from his garden to any club who wants to raise money for the Officers' Fund. Thanks go to San Fernando and Tucson, which held special rhizome sales last year.

Region Meetings: RVP Holk asked affiliates to be prepared to discuss in January 1999 how Region 15 can schedule who will host each spring trek and fall meeting. Two clubs in the past have pulled out of the scheduled wheel for meetings, but Region has been able to find another affiliate to jump in and host it. For Fall 1998, Inland will step in for Southern California. Several members suggested that Region think about the idea of joint region meetings, such the one planned for 1999 by Region 15 and Region 14. Another possibility is to contact Region 23, New Mexico, and see if they may be interested.

Affiliates Meeting: RVP Holk noted that there will be for the first time, a meeting of the local affiliates, at the AIS Convention, thanks to Gerry Snyder. Both Holk and Snyder encourage all to attend, and contribute their ideas to AIS.

Bylaws: A draft of the bylaws, after legal review, was provided to the Board members. Two major changes were proposed: 1) Keep open terms for committee chairs, rather than limiting them to 3 years like the officers; 2) Give all committee chairs a vote. It was MOVED, SECONDED AND CARRIED.

RVP Holk will take the bylaws to Bob Plank again for final legal review before the Fall Meeting.

Tax Free Status: RVP Holk received a letter from AIS Director, RVP Counselor Roy Epperson, inviting Region 15 to be included in a group exception letter as a subordinate organization sponsored by AIS. Thus, we would as a first step be included in tax free status as part of AIS, then finalize our bylaws, and finally, go after our own incorporation as a 501(c) (3) organization. Rinehart proposed that we add the proviso that we extend incorporation status to local affiliates. IT WAS MOVED, SECONDED, AND CARRIED to so proceed.

Bob Plank offered to write up steps on donating to AIS (e.g., in memoriam of a person) for the Region newsletter.

#### **Affiliate Reports:**

Hi Desert - no report.

<u>Inland</u> – President Morgan reported that their Spring Show was a big success. Also, they are now "IRIS" – Inland Region Iris Society, and redid their bylaws.

<u>San Diego</u> — President Rocha reported a good turnout on Bill Rinehart's presentation — iris primer, also at their spring show. And Pete's Scoonchee is 52 inches tall, but no bloom yet.

<u>San Fernando</u> - President Snyder reported judges training on iris color/patterns and rebloomers, also Descanso Gardens.

<u>Southern California</u> – Chairman Jones reported on a nice spring show at the Arboretum, a Valentine Day's party and Schreiner's talk.

<u>Sun Country</u> – President Larson reported 30 entries in the Early Exhibit, with 2<sup>nd</sup> place going to Scoonchee, and welcomed everyone to the Spring Trek.

<u>Tucson</u> – President Evans reported on well-received judges training on broken color by Brad Kasparek, flower arranging by Kathy Kasparek, and Spuria by Charlie Jenkins.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:55 PM.

"American Iris Society Board meeting, June 2, 1998, Denver, CO

After the membership report was given which cited membership net loss, concerns about current calendar year policy were expressed. The solution, in the form of a motion, was passed unanimously. The motion is as follows: "New members, not including reinstated members, joining AIS from April I through September 30, will have an additional six months membership for the current payment. In addition, members joining in this period will have July I join dates and year end expire dates."

Example: A new member who joins with a Single Annual payment on June 15, 1998 will have a join date of July 1, 1998. The expire date for this membership will be December 31, 1999. This member will not receive January and April, 1998 Bulletins. The membership begins with July, 1998 and that is the first issue which will be received. Those who join with a tunial payment will also have a July 1, 1998 join date, but the expire date will be December 31, 2001. (An annual payment pays for 18 months and a triennial payment pays for 42 months. All AIS memberships will

continue to expire at the end of any given calendar year.)
