Cal-Dixie Iris Garden

If you have ever been the Cal-Dixie, then the garden does not need description. I am going to do something different and tell you a little about how Cal-Dixie became the garden that it is.

Herb and Sara Holk moved to their current location in 1978, when the land was bare and the house was just being built. It has grown into the current 2 acres of iris and daylilies known as Cal-Dixie Iris Garden. It is now the largest commercial iris garden in Southern California. The Inland Empire climate is very conducive to growing iris, as is evident in their garden. Because of their garden, you will have a difficult time finding a favorite because you will go from row to row and change your mind as to which is your favorite at each row.

Herb and Sara became interested in iris in 1968 when Herb was a Veterinarian for the US Air Force. They were living in Sebastopol, CA. As Herb drove to the AF Base each day he went past a house that had an iris garden that caught his eye. He and Sara visited the garden and asked the lady of the house if she would consider selling them some of her iris. She did and thus began their odyssey and a love of iris.

When the Air Force moved Herb to Clinton, Maryland, they dug up their small iris garden and moved the iris to Maryland with them. A few years later, the Air Force again moved Herb (very common in the military), this time back to California to Travis AFB. The iris garden moved back with them. A few years later, Herb was moved again, this time to Norton AFB, in San Bernardino, and the iris garden moved with them again.

When they got to San Bernardino, they visited the Valley End Iris Garden owned by Audrey Hein. They got interested in Arils and bought some from her. When the iris went dormant, they thought they had died and called Mrs. Hein, only to find out that she had passed away. Her husband informed Herb that arils, unlike TBs. go dormant and he told him how to care for them. In the conversation he mentioned that he was selling the iris and the land they were on and would he be interested in buying. Herb, still being in the Air Force, did not feel that he could afford the deal but was interested. Mr. Hein called a few weeks later and asked again if he would be interested. Herb and Sara talked to some friends and they decided that together they could buy only the irises if Mr. Hein would sell them. So Herb and Sara went into the iris business in the summer of 1977. Three couples (Jerry and Ruth Wheaton, Corrine and Fritz Bromberger and Herb and Sara) dug, separated and marked the irises from that field and divided them equally. Herb and Sara were living in Base Quarters at the time and their yard was already filled with iris, so Herb rented his next-door neighbors' backyard, roto-tilled and filled it with iris. In 1978 Herb retired from Active Duty, they moved to their current home, and the two backyards of irises have grown into the Cal-Dixie Iris Gardens we saw on this year's trek. After he got the irises planted in their new home, Herb began making some crosses and found that he liked making new irises. He began hybridizing in 1978 and introduced his first iris in 1983.

Herb and Sara are stalwarts of the iris world. They are both Master Judges for AIS, they have both held numerous offices for Inland Region Iris Society and Region 15; Herb is a past Region 15 RVP. They have made irises available to many local societies and Region 15 for sales and auctions and their generosity has aided many local societies.

Thank you, Dr. and Mrs. Holk, for adding to our enjoyment and sharing your wonderful garden with the world of Iris-lovers.





The Kennedy Garden by Christie Pierson

The first thing I noticed when we pulled up to the Kennedy Garden, were all the oohs! and aahs! heard all over the bus. We were treated to a beautiful view of a Victorian home known as "Kennedy Keep", built in 1902. There were well established plantings, including a climbing red rose growing up from among huge clumps of stunning and well-grown irises, then cascading down to the sidewalk. This was just the view from the street!

This is a garden in every sense of the word. Along with beautifully grown irises (no leaf spot anywhere!), there were roses of many varieties. "Brigadoon" was a standout. There were huge (just apply "huge" to everything I mention as everything was very well established!) delphiniums, trailing lavender lantana, red Japanese maples and much more.

Flanking the stairway leading to the front porch were jade plants. At the top of the stairs were topiaries in Victorian urns. The children, Alex and Claire, were sitting at the top of the stairs, sharing their pet Cockatoo and baby possums with us, a scene right out of the Victorian Era. We had refreshments under the gazebo, including fresh strawberries and a special homemade lemon/raspberry punch? (I would love the recipe!)

Some of the outstanding irises included a Louisiana, PROFESSOR NEIL, maroon with a bright yellow signal (tetraploid), that made a stunning clump. THORNBIRD was acting like the Dykes Medal winner that it is – a strangely beautiful iris. Another standout was RIVER RUNNER, a beautiful ruffled mid-blue from Ernst of Cooley's. Last but not least, was Bob Dunn's BAY CITY, a huge ruffled purplish/navy with a gold beard tipped purple. It turned out to be the big winner that night, as <u>Best Out of Region Introduced Iris!</u>

It was a perfect day and a privilege to see such a lovely Victorian home and garden. The hallmarks of this garden are the extremely well-grown cultivars seen everywhere.

Recalling past visits to the Strane's home, I found a larger rose garden with wonderful roses that overwhelmed me with their beauty. The iris garden was a pleasant addition. Rick Tasco's MARIPOSA SKIES and ROYAL STORM, and George Sutton's CORAL POINT were beautiful. Aitken's TRILLION and BLACK CURRANT (IB) by Marky Smith were outstanding. Lauer's SURELY WHITE was surely a winner. Then, hidden in back with all the alstromerias (a huge collection), was a very nice Region 15 Seedling, #83-12 by Pete DeSantis.

Visiting the house moved us back in time. The 1908 Sears and Roebucks vintage home was carefully decorated to complement its heritage. I especially enjoyed the collection of Carnival Glass. My interview with Ralph explained the large pens in the backyard. They currently house four varieties of fancy pheasants, however, I was astounded to hear that this year Ralph had won First Place Nationally out of 12,000 entries with his Aracuana Chicken. He has given up the chickens, so they were not to be seen, but the irises, his 235 rose bushes in full bloom, and all the blooming alstromerias made our visit truly special.

The Bromberger Garden By Kevin Sims

The Bromberger's Garden is a very extraordinary place. It is relatively small, but is packed the irises and other plants and trees. When we first drove up, the first thing you noticed was the tabebuia impetiginosa (common name is the Purple or Pink Trumpet Tree) with purple pinkish flowers on the branches. The Bromberger's put pictures next to the irises, if they were not in bloom. My personal favorite was The Talking Bench. If you stood at the correct spot and talked to the bench, it would "talk" back. But, time was up before we could thoroughly look at everything. So, as we boarded the bus, we all took a last look and waved goodbye.


A Message from RVP Gerry Snyder

All the girls were awarded blue ribbons for their special exhibit. Christine Branch, (Pete DeSantis' granddaughter) won first place in the youth division for artistic design at the SFVIS show held April 13th and 14th. She had taken advantage of a workshop on artistic design given by Eileen Fiumara and Jan Lauritzen a few weeks prior to the show, and put what she learned to good use.

Her sister, Taylor Branch, took 3rd, and a new member, Erika Guzman, took second place.

At the HDI&DS show on April 27th, youth member Joycey Yates took the overall Artistic Design award with her interpretation of "Mulan", an oriental arrangement. On the Spring Trek in Ontario, Elizabeth Rocha received the first LaVerne Conrad Award for youth achievement in Region 15 along with a check for \$100. CALIFORNIA YOUTH WINS NATIONAL AWARD

Memorial Award for Youth Achievement Contest offered by the American Iris Society (AIS). This award which

consists of a certificate and a cash prize, will be presented at the AIS National Convention on April 29th in Memphis, Tennessee.

Beth, who is fifteen years old, grows a beautiful iris garden of many cultivars and has donated hundreds of iris rhizomes to schools and to the iris sales of the San Diego Iris society where she is a member. She participates in the San Diego iris shows and won Best Youth Specimen in 2000 with a miniature tall bearded iris, BELLA VEE. Hybridizing irises to create new, improved varieties is an activity Beth pursues. Her seedlings were viewed

last year at the Region 15 Trek. Beth is also interested in preserving the species irises and grows several given to her by a local botanist who collects them in their native habitat.

Beth participates in the AIS Judges Training program and was promoted to Apprentice Judge last fall. She attends regional iris meetings and treks and is now serving as "Youth Ambassador" to the Region 15 Board of Directors.

San Diego Iris Society members count on Beth to successfully and cheerfully complete any project or task assigned to her. In the words of one member, "Beth is a delightful young lady, inbued with grace and charm, who has seriously pursued her interest in irises in a manner that would serve as a model for adult irisarians, let alone other youths."

Her parents, Steve and Sharlyn Rocha, have fostered Beth's iris interests over the years and her Great Aunt, Lorraine Nicholson of Modesto, California, also encourages Beth. Iris Society members add their congratulations and best wishes to this young lady who has accomplished a great deal in the iris world."

Each girl planted a rhizome of SCOONCHEE (Pete DeSantis '97) in a 3 gal. container, after a lesson on the needs of plants and the many benefits they provide. They especially enjoyed the story of how hybridizer Pete DeSantis named the flower after his grand-daughter, and that the name meant "Little Pest" in Italian. Each received a flyer with a photo of Scoonchee and care and watering instructions. Their AIS Youth Membership dues was paid by their sponsor and project leader, Kathy Chilton.

Throughout the fall, winter, and spring, with the help of Troop Leader Tracy Smith, the young irisarians colored pictures of irises, learned the parts of an iris flower, and cared for their plants.

There were 139 horticulture entries and 20 artistic entries. Best Specimen of Show was a Louisiana iris, CREOLE FLAME and Best TB was ZIGGY, both exhibited by Kathy Chilton.

Marian LeCompte won Best Artistic in the "Zeus" category. There were other flower shows going on in same mall, together called The Fiesta de los Flores, and their overall artistic award went to Marian LeCompte for the same arrangement! 
San Diego & Imperial Counties Iris Society

CHANGE IN AIS INSURANCE

By Michelle Snyder

I have been getting a number of emails from various clubs that are having upcoming sales wanting to know how to go about getting insurance. I would appreciate it if you could provide your respective clubs with the following information.

Our new carrier, found by Debbie Babuscio, is Hartford Insurance. The policy is in the name of The American Iris Society. The additional insured endorsement covers all Regions, Sections, Affiliates and all members thereof, whether or not they are members of AIS. This will be very important to clubs that currently carry a separate policy to cover members that do not belong to AIS. The basic liability coverage is \$1,000,000 but we have a \$4,000,000 umbrella bringing the total amount of liability insurance to \$5,000,000. This is the amount of insurance that most venues in New York and California are requesting be carried.

Hartford DOES NOT charge for the certificates of insurance. As some of your may recall, Travelers was charging \$50 per day. This will be a blessing to the smaller clubs because, I know, a charge of \$50 per day for their event was a burden on many of the clubs.

As far as the National Convention is concerned, the gardens that will be on tour are automatically covered under the policy. As far as I know, the individual gardens will not have to be named, but I will look into this and have an answer before I send my article to Bruce for publication in the October Bulletin. It has taken a long time, but I have finally gotten the policy I want. Interestingly, the premium AIS is being charged for the entire policy, including the umbrella, is less than what we were paying at Travelers.

Here is the information a club needs to get a certificate of insurance:

Call 1-800-457-2379. You will get a recorded message giving you various options. Press #3, insureds, and then you will hear another message. Press #1 and you will be transferred to a representative who will help you. You will need to identify yourself as the insured, The American Iris Society, and provide them with the insurance policy number of 72SBAAA7414. You will then need to give them the name and address of the venue where your event is being held, the date(s) of the event and where you want the certificate sent. If you want it faxed directly to the venue you will need to provide the name of the individual and their fax number. AGAIN, THERE IS NO CHARGE FOR THIS CERTIFICATE.

Treasurer Avery Poling reported a Beginning balance of \$12521.27 Ending balance of \$9297.84. General CD \$11884.47. RVP CD \$8020.40.

- 2. Guest Irises from the U.S.A. will be accepted from Sept. 1 Oct. 15, 2002. Australian irises will be accepted at their normal shipping time for North American orders.

- 4. The name of the variety or seedling number must be clearly marked on each rhizome. In addition, the following information must be clearly marked for each plant on a *Separate Packing List*.
 - a. Hybridizer's name, address, phone number and email (if available).
 - b. Name or seedling number of the variety
 - c. Type of iris (LA or SPU).
 - d. Height, color, and bloom season (E,M.L).
 - e. Year of introduction (if introduced).
- 5. If a guest seedling is named, it is the responsibility of the hybridizer to notify the Guest Iris person not later than December 1, 2004.
- 6. A receipt will be mailed to all contributors. Shortly before the convention, contributors will be asked for instructions regarding the distribution of the plants. Failure to reply by June 15, 2005 will be interpreted as permission to destroy all seedlings and distribute named varieties, one to the garden owner, and the rest to the Region 15 Auction.
- 7. All official guest plants which are to be returned will be shipped postpaid, except to foreign addresses.
- 8. The Trek/Convention Committee and owners of tour gardens will follow the Code of Ethics as printed in the AIS Convention Handbook.
- 9. The Guest Iris Committee will not be responsible for losses beyond its control, and only irises received through the Guest Iris Chairperson will be listed in the convention booklet.
