It is almost autumn and my iris garden lies dormant. The garden, which is glorious in springtime, is pitiful in the summer heat. Several clumps of Lantana and red sage, a stand of sunflowers, and the towering Buddleia give color to the summer garden and keep the hummingbirds and finches occupied. The Historic Iris Preservation Society and Prescott Area Iris Society have programs to keep these beautiful irises around for everyone to enjoy in more years to come (pages 15-16). The bad air quality forced me to go indoors and to look over the pictures from the 2016 Region 15 Spring Trek and the 2016 AIS National Convention in New Jersey.

On a sunny April day, the bus traveled from Simi Valley to San Fernando Valley. We visited four beautiful gardens with about 100 guest irises. It was difficult to choose the Best In Region iris and the Best Out Of Region iris. Our speaker, Dell Perry was great. Her program on Aril and Arilbred Irises was informative. AIS Youth Program Report

Currently we have 6 Youth members in Region 15 — 3 in California and 3 in Arizona. They will each receive a newer rhizome from the AIS National Convention sometime in late August. I know there are groups out there that are working with young people, but they have not signed up to become members in

the AIS. It only costs \$8 for a year's membership and they get a Youth Handbook full of information about irises and growing tips, a youth newsletter twice a year, and they have the opportunity to enter the annual Coloring Contest and the Ackerman Essay Contest for cash prizes.

Have you thought about reaching out to youth members by having a "Youth Meeting"? Inviting local youth groups (Scouts, neighbors, church or school clubs) to attend a special meeting just for them could be a good recruiting tool for you because their parents or other adults would need to bring them to the meeting! I have coloring pages and word search puzzles that I could send you, and ideas about what to talk about with them for a program, such as using the glossary of iris terms and old catalogs to explain the beautiful pictures. It doesn't have to be long - less than an hour is enough for a start. Growing tips is another thing you could add to the program. There are also CD programs showing irises that you could use as well. Irises are drought tolerant plants and we really need to get the message across that you can have beautiful flowers that are good to the environment. Who knows? You might get a few new members.

A Gift Bag of Historic Iris

One of the passions of Prescott Area Iris Society (PAIS) is historic iris. All attendees at their Region 15 Fall Meeting on October 10, 2015 received a gift bag that contained among other things two historic iris, 'Othello' (Lémon 1848) and 'Crimson King' IB & RE (Barr 1893). According to some, Crimson King is one of the best increasers in the garden and is extremely vigorous. I have a few historic iris in my garden: 'Lady Friend' (Ghio 1981), 'Baby Blessed' SDB (Zurbrigg 1979), 'Burgundy Brown' (Gibson 1978), 'Joseph's Mantle' (Craig 1949) and 'Quaker Lady' (Farr 1909), but nothing as old as 1848 or 1893! Wow, think about it! Iris cultivars that have been around for over a hundred years. Now I'm curious, I need more information. From the AIS website at www.irises.org: "A historic iris is one that was introduced 30 or more years ago. Those iris that have survived might be the toughest plants of their generation." They can be very reliable bloomers. Really? Who collects historic iris? AIS suggests that collectors might be people who want to decorate their garden with iris that match the time period of their historic home. Others might collect historic iris to support the preservation effort. And there's also the collector who is interested in tracing the evolution of the modern iris.

Anderson According to the official website of the Historic Iris Preservation Society (HIPS), there are many rare historic irises that are in danger of being lost forever. "The vagaries of life or passing of time can often bring an end to a gardener's life of collecting iris." Rather than having these collections of historic iris destroyed or abandoned. HIPS will offer to rescue and redistribute these older varieties to ensure their survival. Visit the HIPS website at www.historiciris.org and browse their resources. For example, there's the Guardian Gardens iris list where you can review a current list of rescued iris. And the addresses of Display Gardens where you can see historic iris growing in a garden (closest to San Diego is a trio of Display Gardens located east of Sacramento, in Somerset, Placerville and Mt Aukum). There's a photo gallery of historic iris (not that you can ever be sure what the name is of your unknown historic iris, but it might be fun to look through their photos). And a blog that goes on and on and on with interesting guestions and answers. If you are interested in working with the Historic Iris Preservation Society to save a few historics, perhaps you'll become a member of HIPS.

How many varieties of historic iris are in your garden? Last weekend I added two more to my garden. In the future, I'm planning to give a second look at some of the other historic iris in my own garden. They might not be as exotic as 'Strawberry Shake' (Keppel 2012), 'Super Hero' (Ghio 2012) and 'Broome Sunset' (Blyth 2007/08), but they have history. Is it possible that my 'Othello' and 'Quaker Lady' are descendants of iris that once grew in the gardens of famous Americans? If so, these iris would be better than an autograph!

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For the Love of Historic Irises

Like the rest of you, I love irises– all irises. But when it comes to what earns garden space, I have to pick favorites. For that reason, I've chosen to concentrate on growing historic bearded irises– those over 30 years of age, though the bulk of my collection is over 50 years old with most introduced from the 1920s to 1950s.

Modern bearded irises are fine, and I do grow a few, but my passion is for the old ones with their narrower petals, tailored edges and graceful forms. There is real charm and elegance to these antiques and heirlooms that is often missing in today's ruffled varieties. I liken it to the difference between Baroque and Art Deco, or a southern belle's frilled and bedecked ball gown and the eponymous "little black dress."

As a member of the Historic Iris Preservation Society (HIPS), I've worked with the rest of our membership to raise awareness of the value of historic irises and the need to keep them around for future generations.

We preserve some varieties because of their important genetic contributions to the development of the bearded iris. One of the most interesting aspects of growing many historics from a wide variety of eras is getting to see how they have progressed in form, color and pattern over the decades as thousands of talented people contributed to the cause of their improvement. While most folks recognize the importance of preserving such luminaries as Dykes Medal winners, there are many varieties just as good, or better, that left a mark on iris history and deserve to be carried on for their merits. 'Snow Flurry' (Rees 1939) never attained the highest award, but who can deny that it is one of the most important varieties ever produced?

Most historic irises have proven their value as good garden plants just by being survivors, an essential trait as we face extreme weather conditions with more predicted. Incorporating the genes for vigor from the hardiest of our old survivors could greatly strengthen new lines of breeding. Who knows what else our talented hybridizers will do as science continues to unlock the secrets of DNA? And who can say what old varieties may hold a clue in their genes that answers a question we have yet to even ask? If they are not here for future study, that genetic record will be lost, and perhaps a key gene arrangement with it.

There is also the sentimental aspect of preserving old irises. Many of us were first exposed to irises in our mothers' or grandmothers' gardens, or perhaps another beloved relative or friend. Growing irises, especially the varieties they loved and passed down to us, is a way to remember these special folks. I am fortunate to have several varieties that grew in my grandmothers' gardens and a few from a great aunt as well. Most are common varieties without a particularly special history, but they are the most special of all to me.

I'd like to encourage everyone to give a thought to iris preservation when you are discarding old varieties for new ones in your garden. If they are not commonly found in commerce anymore, please consider contacting HIPS to see if we can assist in distributing them to gardens that would welcome older varieties and make sure their beauty and potential remain around for future generations to enjoy.

If you are not a HIPS member I would encourage you to join. It is a very informative group within AIS. If you have these publications I encourage you to read these and take action. If you are not currently members I encourage you to go to both the HIPS website and AIS website to read these articles. Richard Marcusen Sculpture Garden Receives Prestigious AIS Designation

The Richard Marcusen Sculpture Garden, at Yavapai College in Prescott, has just received two prestigious designations by the national American Iris Society (AIS). The first designation by the American Iris Society is that of an AIS National Display Garden for the sculpture garden's combination of low water use iris plantings provided by the Prescott Area Iris Society in conjunction with the display of sculptures of local and nationally recognized artists. The garden has been designated as a national Historic Iris Preservation Display Garden for its collection of the William R. Dykes Medal Irises. The William R. Dykes Medal is the highest award that can be achieved by iris hybridizers for the development of a new and unique iris variety.



Along with plantings including the children's Story Book Garden, the Black Iris Garden and the Francelle Edwards iris collection, the sculpture garden provides a unique blend of native and naturalized plant materials, walkways, seating areas and mountain vistas. The Yavapai College Foundation, the Friends of Yavapai College Art and the Prescott Area Iris Society, a combination of public and private cooperation, have contributed to creating a place of beauty and enjoyment for the college community and the public. These prestigious designations were formally announced by the President of the American Iris Society at their 2016 National Convention in Newark, New Jersey in May. The gardens peak bloom season is during mid-May to the end of May.
