I first attended a judge's training session at the 2009 Spring Trek in Phoenix out of a simple desire to learn more about these flowers that I love. AIS Youth Program Report

Well folks, we need to recruit more youth members for Region 15. We are one of the largest regions in AIS, but we only have 8 youth members - 6 in California and 2 in Arizona. Do any of you know a youth group, Girl Scout or Boy Scout troop, teacher in a classroom that would like to grow irises at the school?

Children love to grow things, and irises do well in combination gardens with vegetables and ornamental plants. If your club has extra rhizomes after the sales, or from your members digging clumps, approach a youth group and see if they would be interested in growing these beautiful drought tolerant plants. Having a member or two to speak or give a CD presentation is a terrific way to encourage young people to make the environment greener, and to learn about our favorite flowers.

Why not create a 'kids table' at your next show and sale? Place one or two irises in containers that they can touch, and smell, give them pages to color (I can provide some for you), word search puzzles (I've got those too!), and use old catalogs that they can look through. Old catalogs also make wonderful collage material that the kids can cut and glue onto a picture to take home.

Membership in AIS is only \$8 a year without the Bulletin, and provides youth with a handbook about growing irises, 2 youth newsletters just for them, and the opportunity to receive newer irises donated by AIS. This year AIS Youth members will be getting a Louisiana iris! So let's recruit more youth members. You will be glad you did.

AIS Region 15 Treasurer's Report

I am hoping to have a more comprehensive report at the Region 15 Spring meeting. The books are undergoing an audit, per the region by-laws. Once that job has been completed, I will proceed with opening a new checking account and hopefully transfer our money market account to somewhere that will offer us more income than the few cents we have been earning each month.

We need to approve a Region 15 budget. Any suggestions from the clubs for fund raising efforts would be appreciated. We really need each region affiliate to commit to a minimum \$500 commitment, plus volunteer to host either a spring or fall regional. Currently, we are running in the red and have been for a few years. Our normal region expenses just do not get covered by the income we generate, so I would really like to hear your views on fundraising.

Our expenses average more than \$5200 per year, which includes our website, our newsletter (which is one of the best in AIS), awards, officer expenses, cost of hosting the Spring and Fall meetings, shipping and postage, and miscellaneous charges that we may encounter. With a minimum commitment of \$500 from each of our 10 affiliates, we can raise \$5000. I am aiming to present the budget at the Region 15 Spring meeting. Any ideas or suggestion are welcome. Thank you.

LOUISIANA IRIS GROWING TIPS

LOCATION:

- Provide at least a half day of sun. Unless the irises are growing in water, a little shade is a good thing.
- * Avoid tree roots to the extent possible.
- Regular beds are fine; boggy conditions are great but not necessary.
- * Be able to provide consistent moisture. If the irises are exposed to a summer dry spell without consistent watering, they will tend to go dormant, and, at least, the foliage may not look good until fall.

SOIL PREPARATION:

- * Dig in several inches of compost or other organic material (e.g., finely ground bark or peat moss).
- If preparing the beds several weeks in advance, work in chemical or organic fertilizer (equivalent of 1 lb. of 8-8-8 per 10 square feet of iris beds; if planting irises immediately, apply the fertilizer as a top dressing after the irises are planted.
- * An acid to slightly alkaline soil is fine.

PLANTING:

- * Space irises with room to "walk" in the direction in which the leaves are growing from the rhizome and 6" to 9" apart in a triangular pattern.
- * Plant with the rhizome just covered with soil, 1/2 to 3/4 inches.
- Mulch after planting, e.g., with 2-3 inches of ground bark, leaves, or pine straw.

MAINTENANCE:

- * Fertilize established beds in September or October and again in late February or March.
- * In the Fall, use 1 lb. of 8-8-8, or equivalent, per 10 sq. ft of iris bed. In the Spring, use the same amount, or a bit less.
- Regularly remove and discard any foliage that yellows. Don't compost the yellowed foliage since it can harbor the disease of rust.
- * Keep the beds consistently moist. If the irises get too dry, they will cease growing and the foliage will not be attractive. The plants will resume growing in the fall, however.
- * Remove bloom stalks after the bloom season unless you want to harvest seeds in late June or early July. Cut stalk to within an inch or so of the ground.
- If the stalks are not removed, at least remove any seed pods before summer to avoid unwanted seedlings popping up among existing plants.

Center. We have all the Tall Bearded Guests in Bed 4 and we made 2 special beds for the Louisiana and Arilbred guest irises. They are all showing great increase and we are already getting bloom stalks on the some of the Louisianas. Hooker Nichols and Jim Hedgecock sent us a nice selection of LA rhizomes, which we planted in sunken containers in one of the low raised beds. We have TBs, BBs and ABs from Kanarowski, Schreiners, Keppel, Sutton, Painters, Gedietz, Deaton, Hedgecock and Toth and some seedlings from these hydridizers as well. All the rhizomes we received in August, September and October were immediately potted and kept in filtered sun until the end of October to give them a head start in the grueling heat we have here in Riverside. We have found our late summers to be way too hot and dry for new rhizomes to be planted directly into the ground on arrival, but with the extra TLC they rooted well, and many had started to increase when we planted them the 1st of November.

Our garden was selected to be on the Riverside Community Flower Show and garden Tours this year. The show is located at the Elks Club in Riverside and there are 6 gardens on the tour April 14 and 15. The link for more information is http://www.riversideflowershow.info/. We are excited for the opportunity to share our love of iris with those who are touring the gardens and hope to get more people informed and enthused about growing irises. We will have our first sales that weekend with a small booth at the garden and our usual booth at the Elks Club.

Our club iris show and sale is April 28th this year at Jurupa Mountain Discovery Center. We had to schedule it later this year due to all the commitments with the Riverside Flower Show and to give our members a weekend to attend the Region 15 Spring Trek April 20 and 21 in Phoenix. Our theme this year is "Holiday Celebration" and we will have horticulture and design categories. We are working with a local girl scout group to teach them design- we will have a youth design category this year as well. Our final spring sale is at the Yucaipa Music and Art Festival May 4,5, and 6 in Yucaipa CA. Charles (Chuck) Brooker and his wife Barbara have been long time active members of our club, participating in our marking parties, sales and displaying beautiful stalks and arrangements in our shows. We will miss his smile, and hello hugs.

My husband and I are relocating to Denver to be closer to our parents. I will be stepping down as President of Inland Region Iris Society, but plan to remain involved in the club as much as possible and will be assisting with the Facebook photos and informational posts for our Virtual Spring Trek 2019. We hope to be able to spend a few months back in California as well to help attend to the garden through the winter. I have been potting iris to take back with me to plant in our yard in Denver - I'm sure I'll need a shoehorn to get them all in our 5th wheel, but I have too many favorites. San Fernando Valley Iris Society Report






