Spring is right around the corner and I couldn't be any happier to see it arrive.

I'm glad I fertilized my other irises when I did because today it is raining and it's supposed to for the next 3 or 4 days. The rains are a little late this year but just the same I'm glad they're here. Today I was rewarded with my first bloom "Kalifa's Robe" an Airlbred iris. I try to grow as many different types of iris as I can. I have TB's, Spuria iris, Louisiana irises and species to name a few.

I know the top of this page says that I'm the editor but to tell you the truth Beth Train the past editor has done more work than I have, and I can't thank her enough. Thank you Beth, your help is greatly appreciated. She has been a life saver on the past few issues and it shows in the final and printed versions. Her photos are all aligned and have descriptions under each one. The margins line up and the colors are harmonious and bright.

This newsletter is published in two forms. One is online in the Region 15 website which has no costs incurred. The other in full color print which is printed by a commercial printer and comes with a cost. I know some clubs have members who do not have a computer or the internet and therefore cannot read the newsletter unless it's printed and mailed to them. We need to cut expenses since it exceeds our income and I think we all know what happens when you operate with a negative budget. Beginning with the Fall 2020 issue the number of printed copies will be reduced. Each club President will receive 5 copies to distribute to members who do not have internet access. This will reduce printing costs, mailing costs and save the Region hundreds of dollars each year. I know some of you still want your printed newsletter. So we are proposing passing the cost on to you. A \$10.00 annual fee will be collected for each member for both issues during the year. We wish all of you well. Stay healthy, keep safe, and follow public health ordinances as appropriate.







AIS Judges Training

The Board of Directors for the American Iris Society has advanced Jenine Cook and Cheryl Dreska to G/E judges and they advanced Fred Jaeggi to apprentice. Congratulations to all of you!

While we have gained two judges in the Region we also lost two this past year so we remain at 28 judges- 15 in California and 13 in Arizona. We now have two apprentices in Arizona and 17 students.

Any person may enter the Judge's Training Program by filling out an application form, which is found elsewhere this Report. Please be aware that you must immediately become an AIS member since membership is a requirement for all persons in the training program and all judges. Are you currently a member and do you know when your membership lapses? You may check your AIS membership on the website: www.aislookup.org Simply enter your last name and your membership expiration date will be shown. I occasionally do have to remind students and even judges that their membership has expired, but there is a grace period.

When a student signs an application for the training program, they will have three years to obtain the 10 hours of training. *"The ten hours of required training must have been completed within the three year period immediately preceding recommendation for appointment as an Apprentice judge."* (pg. 5, Handbook for Judges and Show Officials) I fill out advancement reports in the fall and keep track of student hours, but this is a good habit for students to develop since you will be required to report your training hours as a judge.

Judges Training sessions are offered at the Region 15 Spring and Fall Treks and this year there will be two hours at the Region 15 Spring Trek in West Covina, California. Clubs also offer training sessions and you may travel to attend AIS Conventions or even other Regional treks to obtain training hours. I do approve all training sessions and you may contact me to see when training sessions are available in the Region.

My rebloomers have been sending up stalks and even some non-rebloomers are blooming, and my weeds are also very happy (but not for long).

NEW ZEALAND, NEW ZEALANDERS AND IRISES by Andi Rivarola

Excerpts from article published in Spuria News, Spring 2020, pp. 7-10. Reprinted with permission.

In November of 2019, I had the good fortune of being invited to attend the New Zealand iris Society's Spring Convention, and to give a program on spuria irises. As it was explained to me, this time it was in the South Island, in Timaru to be precise, 165 km south of Christchurch. Conventions in New Zealand are alternatively held in the North and South Islands. So, where should I start to narrate this experience?

I need to start with this, New Zealanders are amazing people. They are open-minded, kind, generous and very interested in nature...my kind of people! I arrived in Auckland, via Hawaii, very late on a Sunday evening, on November 10th. Unfortunately I had no chance to visit Auckland because the very next day, Monday November 11th, my travelling buddy Gary White and I took a train called the Northern Explorer to Wellington, the southernmost tip of North Island, a ride that took 10 hours.

We stayed in Wellington for three days, visiting the Wellington Botanical Gardens, which included the beautiful Lady Norwood Rose Garden and a classic Victorian greenhouse called the Begonia house.

Next, we took a three and a half hour ferry ride from Wellington to Picton, located in the northern tip of the southern Island—the boat was called the Interislander.

Then came a ride on the Coastal Pacific; for six hours from departing Picton, the train hugged the coast as we enjoyed the beautiful Southern Pacific Ocean on the east side and the Kaikuora mountains to the west. Our destination on this day was Christchurch. The very next day we walked through the large and beautiful Christchurch Botanic Gardens, which was home to a gorgeous iris collection, and many trees and plants not only form New Zealand buy also from around the world. There I discovered a plant that I added to my wish list, a member of the genus Iridaceae from South America called Libertia formosa, also known as the Chilean iris- with large sword-like leaves, resembling a mix of irises and New Zealand Flax, topped with creamy flowers.

The very next day, a two-hour bus ride brought us to our destination, Timaru; a coastal town that in many ways reminded of the Southern California coastal areas of the 70's– tranquil, with fresh ocean breezes, green fields and hills, and country roads just fifteen minutes in the interior.

May will be a busy month. Two iris sales on the same weekend! We are relying on our hardworking dedicated members to be able to pull these through.



Looking Ahead: We are preparing to host the 2021 Spring Trek. We will feature three gardens in different climatic zones of San Diego County. Everything is in the ground and some of the iris for next year's trek are sending up bloom stalks this year. As a result of this discussion, several of us chose to plant some of our iris to include Recipe 420. This media contains micronutrients and mycorrhizae. Data from our experiments is being collected and will be shared in a future article. In December we had our annual Holiday Party where we celebrated another year of growing iris. We ate delicious ham and turkey along with a multitude of side dishes and deserts. This year door prizes were tall beardeds, arilbreds and Louisianas. In January we were treated to Bob Sussman speaking about Pacific Coast Native Iris. We saw pictures of native iris named by Douglas and many hybrids including Canyon Snow. We were fortunate to get a Pacific Coast Native Iris to try to grow in our San Diego gardens. Mine is alive so far, so fingers crossed. In February, The San Diego Iris Society celebrated our 57th birthday at the Seven Seas Best Western. Gary White from Lincoln, Nebraska treated us to a program and judges training about Historic Iris. He shared pictures of historic Iris that even though some varieties were introduced more than 100 years ago they are still thriving in gardens across the country. He talked about how tetraploidy was introduced into iris and how that makes a difference in flower form.



In Memoriam


IRENE VIEIRA BENTON (1922–2020)

Irene Kathleen (Vieira) Benton, 97, passed on February 2, 2020, at Eskaton, her home in Grass Valley, California.

Irene chose to move to Eskaton be close to her daughter Bonnie in 2012. She loved living there and became involved in all of the activities they offered. Bonnie had to make an appointment to see her mother because she was too busy doing needlework, being on the board, doing crafts for Hospice, helping with the neighboring school kids, reading, keeping up with her grandkids lives and watching football. She never forgot the names of anyone; not one guarterback or neighbor. She was a true friend to all.

Irene was born to Angelina (Seitz) and John Vieira on November 12, 1922, in Wailea, Hawaii.

She grew up as an island native, diving into the local swimming holes, pausing only to pick a mango and stick of sugarcane for lunch. She graduated from Hilo High School and then boarded a ship, by herself, for the mainland to study dental hygiene at the



University of Southern California. While there she met a handsome Marine fighter pilot – "the love of her life" – on a blind date.

Richard "Bennie" Benton married Irene on January 10, 1946. Life was not always easy being a Marine Corps wife. Bennie was often gone for long periods of time. It was not uncommon for her to tell her children to pack up their rooms on a Tuesday and the moving truck would arrive on Friday to take them away from friends and schools to a new home far away. They all welcomed the adventure.

Irene became a wonderful homemaker and always had hot meals on

the dinner table, cold martinis in the refrigerator and floral fresh arrangements on the tabletops. The squadron travelled together and they formed long lasting friendships. Bennie retired from the Marine Corps after 21 years and many moves across country, to Riverside, California.

Irene had studied Ikebana flower arranging while living in Hawaii. She became an accredited flower show judge for rose, iris and horticulture and had a rose and an iris named after her.

She was longtime member (honorary) of the Inland Region Iris Society where she shared her tips and techniques for floral design.



She was proceeded in death by her husband, Richard "Bennie" Wayne Benton, after 61 years of marriage.
