Anza Borrego Desert SP reported that they only got 3.7 inches of rain since July 2020. Hello Irisarians,

Spring is Coming! No - Spring is already here!

AIS Judges Training

Hello Region 15! I hope you are staying well and keeping safe.

As of this writing, the Region has 18 G/E Judges, 7 Master Judges, 1 Emeritus Judge, 3 Apprentices, and 11 students. Be sure to avail of training programs in your area, from the AIS Webinars, and/or from spring treks. Visit as many iris gardens as you can this spring. Don't forget to keep track of your activities and be ready to send your reports in August.

Please take note of your AIS membership expiry dates. All judges, accredited or in training, are required to be current AIS members. You will be dropped as judge/trainee if your membership expires. Check your AIS membership on the website: <u>www.aislookup.org</u> Simply enter your name and Region 15. Your membership expiration date will be shown. I will occasionally remind students and even judges if their membership has expired, but it is good practice to know it yourself.

The updated 8th edition of the AIS Handbook for Judges and Show Officials is available online both as a colored edition and a black and white edition. Download the pdf copy to your smart devices for ease of reference. You can even download just specific chapters as you need them. Another option is to purchase the 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 printed paper copy from the AIS storefront.

Affiliate Judges Chairpersons and/or Presidents, please inform me of judges training programs you plan to schedule. The programs have to be approved by me. I keep a record of them so I can inform all the region 15 affiliates. Inland Region Iris Society had a JT scheduled on March 1st with Claire Schneider doing a program on Aril and Arilbred Irises. AIS resumes its Webinar Series with a JT on Awards and Ballots presented by Gary White. You have to attend both sessions on March 2nd and March 9th, both of which start at 5:30 pm PST, to get credit.

I encourage Region 15 members to sign up in the Judge's Training Program. It is both fun and educational. Anyone may enter the Judge's Training Program by filling out an application form, which is on the Region 15 website: region15ais.org Please make sure that you immediately become an AIS member, since membership is a requirement for all persons in the training program and all judges. When a student signs an application for the training program, the student will have three years to obtain the 10 hours of training. *"The ten hours of required training must have been completed within the three year period immediately preceding recommendation for appointment as an Apprentice judge."* I keep track of student hours and fill out advancement reports in the fall. While students are not required to submit activity reports, it is a good habit to develop as you will be required to report your training hours as a judge.

I look forward to seeing you at the Region 15 Spring Trek in San Diego. I plan to attend the AIS National Convention in Las Cruces, NM so I will likely see you there, too.

Hope you all have a gorgeous iris bloom season this spring!

Summary of Requirements

Source: AIS Judges Handbook 8th Edition July 2021

Chapter 1: Judges; Page 9

Requirements to be completed as a candidate for judgeship:

- 1) Maintain three years of continuous AIS membership.
- 2) Make application for entry into the judges training program
- 3) Successfully complete a minimum of two training sessions for a total of ten hours, passing written examinations on each occasion.
- 4) Obtain the recommendation of five fully accredited judges.
- 5) Complete any additional regional requirements.

Requirements to be completed as an apprentice judge:

- 1) Maintain continuous AIS membership.
- 2) Complete two two-hour sessions of garden training under different AIS fully accredited judges.
- 3) Complete two two-hour sessions of show judging under different AIS fully accredited judges.
- Successfully complete a two-hour course on Awards and Ballots. (A training session on Awards and Ballots taken within the three years immediately prior to appointment as apprentice judge can be counted to satisfy this requirement.)
- 5) Complete all requirements within three years after being appointed an apprentice judge.
- 6) Complete the annual activity report.
- 7) Complete any additional regional requirements.

Requirements for maintaining status as a garden/exhibition or master judge:

- 1) Maintain continuous AIS membership.
- 2) Vote the official AIS Ballot each year before the deadline. Failure to do so for two consecutive years will result in automatic disqualification.
- 3) Attend and successfully complete refresher courses during each three-year period. Five hours (two of which must be in-garden training) is required for garden/exhibition judges and three hours credit (one of which must be in-garden training) is required of master judges.
- 4) Complete the annual activity report. Failure to do so for two consecutive years will result in automatic disqualification.
- 5) Complete any additional regional requirements.

Emeritus judges maintain their status by maintaining continuous membership in the American Iris Society.

Recording Rebloom Data... Help Us Out, please!

The popularity of reblooming iris continues to grow. Why? Rebloomers can provide double the number of days of bloom of a spring-only blooming iris.

According to the 8th edition of the *Handbook for Judges*, there are five patterns of rebloom:

- (1) Cyclic rebloomers have two distinct cycles of bloom. After flowering in the spring, the cultivar has a second, almost predictable, period bloom.
- (2) Multiple blooming iris are cultivars that send up bloom stalks repeatedly at any time throughout the growing season.
- (3) Repeaters are cultivars that produce additional bloom stalks either immediately following the spring bloom or shortly thereafter. Some of the repeater cultivars have bloom periods lasting up to eight weeks.
- (4) Sporadic rebloomers send up bloom stalks, unpredictably, during the growing season. Many of these cultivars will rebloom regularly in warmer climates (e.g., Southern California). However, they tend to be more unpredictable in their bloom pattern when grown in colder climates.
- (5) Secondary stalk rebloomers are cultivars that send up a second bloom stalk from the same rhizome during the same growing season. These cultivars are rare. Of late, a sixth pattern is emerging, the ever-bloomer. This iris sends up bloom stalks all year long.

We rely on the hybridizers to tell us if their cultivar is a spring-only bloomer or a rebloomer. However, the registration of a cultivar as a spring-only bloomer might not be entirely accurate. Many spring-only iris rebloom for gardeners in Southern California and other warm-climate zones.

Please help determine if a spring-only iris is actually a rebloomer here. We are asking you to contribute your bloom and rebloom records so that a more accurate picture of the bloom season of each cultivar can be made. Recording your bloom data is simple and straight-forward.

Mary Platner has created an easy to fill-in chart for recording bloom and rebloom. Just mark a "X" on the chart when the iris is in bloom. No beginning or end dates are needed. You can print the form and write in your data or keep the chart on your computer as a fill-in document. There are two sheets, one for January to June and other for July to December. We call these the January Sheet and the July Sheet. Instructions are on the sheets.

FYI, the report form asks for your plant zone, which is easy to determine. Just type "plant zone for (list your zip code)" in your internet's search bar.

Send your completed sheets attached to an email to <u>MaryPlatner@msn.com</u> If your sheets are paper copies, mail them to Claire Schneider, P.O. Box 2035, Ramona, CA 92065.

Please join this endeavor no matter how many or few reblooming iris are in your garden. The collective record of everyone's bloom information will be published in the winter edition of the *Reblooming Iris Recorder*.

One more thing. The Reblooming Iris Society (RIS) publishes a lengthy digital newsletter twice a year with iris rebloom data, regional news, research articles, notes of personal experiences, and commercial sources for reblooming iris. If you are interested in rebloomers or would like to support RIS, consider joining the society. Membership in RIS is \$12 per year or \$25 for 3 years. Lompoc Valley Iris Society Report

The Lompoc Valley Iris Society (LVIS) is opening the world of iris to over 250 elementary school children in Santa Barbara County, California. In 2019, Region 15 member Ken Ainslie started a program to introduce 3rd thru 8th

graders at the Santa Ynez Valley Charter School to the joy of growing tall bearded iris. With the support of the school principal, a garden space was created and over 300 AIS registered iris were provided. Every student was invited to select and plant an iris. The iris were donated by members of both Region 14 MDIS and Region 15 LVIS clubs. The program provides instruction by Ken about the planting, feeding and care, as well as a hands-on learning experience.

Each iris is identified with a metal tag with the iris name, date planted and student's name. Each student is given a photo of the iris they planted and information about the iris. The iris will continue to be associated with the student for all the years they are at the school as they watch it grow and bloom. As the iris bloom, a photo of the bloom is posted to the school web page, with the student's name, for all students and parents to see. Students enjoy passing through the garden and pointing to the iris they planted. As iris increase, the plants are divided and students are offered the increase (baby iris plant) for their own home gardens, to share with their families and neighbors.

Every year, the newest third grade class adds to the garden by planting their own iris. The iris remain in the garden as long as the student is at the school.

The program expanded in 2020 to include an additional garden space for school staff and school volunteer iris gardens.

The program was expanded again in 2021. The school sponsored an elective class for sixth grade students to prepare, landscape, plant and maintain their own special "6th Grade Flower Garden," with over 40 iris. In this program, students continue to learn about iris types, hybridizing, fertilizing, watering, and dividing iris. They chose the iris they wanted to grow from a list. This garden also migrates with these same students over their time at the school.

Student interest in growing iris has expanded with the support of the LVIS club. In late 2021, the Lompoc Miguelito Elementary School invited the club to create an iris garden for the second-grade class. The principal and the second-grade teacher helped thirty excited students each plant their own iris. The iris will follow the student during their time at the school and we hope to add additional beds as more students/teachers get involved.


