

AIS Judges Training

Hello Region 15! I hope you are keeping cool and being careful when out in your gardens in this summer heat. Heat exhaustion is real and comes on fast (don't ask me how I know). Self care and safety always come first. I just heard on the news that more triple degree temperatures are predicted for the Inland Empire. Oh, how I long for the crisp fall air!

As of this writing, the Region has 20 G/E Judges, 7 Master Judges, 1 Emeritus Judge, 5 Artistic Design Judges, 2 Apprentices, and 6 students. Three judges were recommended for Artistic Design Certification. Region 15 is in of need more judges! I encourage Region 15 members to sign up in the Judge's Training Program. It is both fun and educational. Anyone may enter the Judge's Training Program by filling out an application form, which is at the Region 15 website: region15ais.org Please make sure that you immediately become an AIS member. AIS membership is a requirement for all persons in the training program and all judges.

Thank you AIS judges for voting for the AIS Awards this year. Tom Burseen's 2015 tall bearded iris introduction "Don't Doubt Dalton" won the AIS Dykes Medal. The list of awards is available to view at wiki.irises.org/Main/InfoAwards2023

Were you among the 56% of AIS Judges who voted electronically? If not, give it a try next year. Online voting is easy, fast, and secure. Besides, you don't have to log in all your votes in one go. The system is set up so that you may go back to it as many times as you want until you click on "submit." You can still use your paper ballot for recording preliminary choices and/or evaluations in the field. Of note, 10% of eligible judges did not vote; 3 of them are in Region 15. Of the three, two will be dropped from the JT roster because it is their 2nd year of not voting. They have expressed their desire to drop out of the program because of hectic work schedules. They still love irises and will continue to grow them.

Judges and students, please do take advantage of training sessions offered in your area, during the regional treks and meetings, and at the national conventions. Online JT opportunities are also available. AlS Webinars offer Judges Training sessions periodically. As an AlS member, you should be getting email updates on this. All AlS JT Webinars are available for free on the AlS YouTube Channel. It is convenient and user-friendly. I have recently approved this JT session: "Iris Terminology and Color Patterns" on February 6, 2024 in Riverside, CA for 1.5 hrs. credit.

Please take note of your AIS membership expiry dates. All judges, accredited or in training, are required to be current AIS members. You will be dropped as judge/trainee if your membership expires and is not renewed within the grace period. Check your AIS membership on the website: www.irises.org/web-based-lookup/ (which now redirects to www.irises.org/web-based-lookup).

Lastly, remember to update your contact information on file with the AIS membership secretary and with the Region's JT Chair. Important information and other updates can get to you ONLY if the data on file is current.

This is my last year as Asst. RVP and JT Chair. It has been a pleasure to serve the region and its members. I have made most files digital and made filling out the Activity Report Form on the computer an option. Online (via email) submission of reports (in pdf) is acceptable. Check out the Judges Training page at the Region 15 website. JT Application Forms, Activity Report Forms, and Evaluation Forms are available to view and download. Judges' requirements and other information are available there, too.

Thank you SFVIS for hosting the Region 15 Spring Trek last April. Mason and I had a wonderful time and enjoyed the warmth of friends, the beauty of the iris gardens, and the delicious food. I am looking forward to attending the Fall Meeting hosted by the LVIS this October.



There are benefits to being a member of the American Iris Society (AIS). One is the automatic membership in Region 15. Another is receiving *IRISES: The Bulletin*, the quarterly magazine of AIS.



However, because *The Bulletin* is published only four times a year, news about upcoming iris events can be missed. The AIS produces webinars on all kinds of topics related to irises. The latest webinar, #35, broadcast on June 10, 2023, was "Exciting Irises of the Middle East." Dr. Fragman-Sapir gave such an interesting presentation that now I am interested in visiting Israel to see those irises! Webinar #31 was "Judging Bearded Irises as Garden Plants." There are usually 10 to 15 webinars each year. Specific dates and enrollment details of the webinars are NOT in *The Bulletin*, but they are posted in *News & Notes*, which is the digital newsletter of AIS. Also included in issues of *News & Notes* are the latest results of the AIS ballot, announcements of the contests, and updates on conventions.

By the way, all of the AIS webinars are available for viewing on the American Iris Society YouTube channel. Some of them offer judges training credit.

EXPANDING YOUR IRIS HORIZONS

Are you an irisarian with a garden of tall bearded iris? How many varieties of tall yellow OR tall purple OR tall yellow and purple iris do you have? Dozens? Maybe hundreds? Of course, the flowers are gorgeous, but the problem is that you will see flowers for three or four weeks and then nothing until next year. Wouldn't it be nice to see irises blooming in your garden for four or five months and even longer? How do you get that kind of bloom season? It's simple. Grow other classes of iris in your garden. There are arilbred and median irises that bloom before the tall bearded, and spuria and Louisiana irises that bloom after the tall bearded irises. Some of the iris species can bloom continually for a couple of months. Even in the heat and with careful management, the Japanese and Siberian irises will bloom really late. And then there are the reblooming irises, which can bloom anytime of the year. You want a longer bloom season of iris? Add other classes of irises to your garden.

To learn more about these different classes of irises, visit some of the websites listed below. Each website provides culture advice, a list of commercial sources, upcoming convention details, and more. Some of the groups hold annual online seed and rhizome sales, where you can find bargains and unusual irises. Consider becoming a member of one of the cooperating societies or sections of the American Iris Society. As a member, you will receive their newsletter, which will contain culture advice, stories of garden visits, lots of colorful photos, information about upcoming conventions, and more. Maybe opt for a one-year subscription to a different iris society every year.

Cooperating Societies (independent of the American Iris Society)

- ♣ Aril Society International (www.arilsociety.org \$17.50 per year for individual, \$21 per year for family) Their newsletter is issued three times a year. Their online library contains articles about cultivating arilbreds, germinating iris seeds and much more. Discover how to participate in their online seed and rhizome sales.
- ♣ Tall Bearded Iris Society (www.tbisonline.com \$12 per year / \$33 for three years) Their publication, Tall Talk, is issued twice a year and is available online. You don't have to be a member to read articles such as "Improving your Garden Soil" and "What Irises Have Done to Me."






Sections of the American Iris Society (AIS) (in order by charter date, oldest to youngest)

- ♣ Median Iris Society (<u>www.medianiris.com</u> \$12 per year / \$30 for three years) Their publication, *The Medianite*, is issued twice a year.
- ♣ Society for Siberian Irises (<u>www.socsib.org</u> \$10 per year / \$25 for three years) Their publication, *The Siberian Iris*, is issued twice a year. An archive of old issues is available online, issues Spring 1961 to Fall 2007. Their website contains information about culture, display gardens, and their popularity poll.

- ♣ Spuria Iris Society (www.spuriairissociety.org \$12 per year / \$30 for three years) Their publication, *The Spuria News*, is issued twice a year. One of their webpages is all about the culture of spuria. Their next convention will be April 26-28, 2024, a joint convention with the Society for Louisiana Irises.
- Society for Japanese Irises (www.socji.org \$10 per year / \$25 for three years) Their publication, *The SJI Review*, is issued twice a year. Their website has a page just for blogs. Very interesting with gorgeous photos! The 2024 AIS national convention will focus on Japanese irises.



♣ Reblooming Iris Society (www.rebloomingiris.com \$12 per year / \$25 for three years) Their digital publication, *The Reblooming Iris Recorder*, arrives twice a year via your email address. It contains data and charts that show the rebloom of irises by month and organized by region. You want to know what blooms in your region? Their newsletter will help with that.




WELCOME to the Reblooming Iris Society!

Envision beautiful irises that bloom again after their spring blossom. These irises are called "rebloomers."

- ♣ Dwarf Iris Society (www.dwarfirissociety.org \$12 per year / \$29 for three years) Their publication, DIS Portfolio, is issued once a year along with a monthly email newsletter, Tiny Talk.
- ♣ Society for Pacific Coast Native Irises (www.pacificcoastiris.org \$15 per year / \$40 for three years. A digital membership is \$7 per year / \$19 for three years) Their publication, *Pacific Iris*, is issued twice yearly. They offer an annual seed exchange and occasional field expeditions to see wild species. There are separate tabs on their website for wild iris and garden iris, each with lots of culture information.
- ♣ Species Iris Group of North America (SIGNA) (www.signa.org \$13 per year / \$6.50 for an annual emembership). Their publication, SIGNA Bulletin, is issued twice a year. Their primary fund raiser is an annual seed exchange, and their website has extensive information about germination and culture of those seeds. Check out the species database. It's incredible!





- ♣ Historic Iris Preservation Society (www.historiciris.org \$16 per year / \$40 for three years / \$12 for emembership per year) Their publication, *Roots*, is issued twice a year. One of the tabs near the bottom of the homepage is a link to an iris color classification chart from 1939. Interested in being part of the team that is preserving historic iris? Read all about Guardian Gardens, one of the tabs at the top of their homepage. Read about their annual sale of historic rhizomes.
- ♣ Society for Louisiana Iris (www.louisianas.org \$17 per year / \$45 for three years) Their publication, Fleur de Lis, is issued four times a year. There's a great collection of articles about the culture of Louisiana iris under the tab "Growing" on their website's home page. Their next convention will be April 26-28, 2024, a joint convention with the Spuria Iris Society.



♣ Novelty Iris Society (\$15 per year / \$40 for three years) Their e-newsletter is published twice a year with articles on hybridizers, irises, and information about gardens. They don't have a website, but you can read about them on the AIS website.

To see lots of photos of all these types of iris, visit the *Iris Encyclopedia (the wiki)* sponsored by the American Iris Society (AIS) at wiki.irises.org

Are you ready to see some of these irises in real life? Consider attending a national convention with garden tours. The 2024 AIS National Convention will showcase Japanese irises. Or at your next club meeting, ask to visit a garden where some of these classes of irises are grown. You will see the irises up close and hear advice on how to grow them. Although perhaps not as showy as the tall bearded irises, these other classes of irises can be just as intriguing and, best of all, they will extend your iris bloom season.

Here's wishing you fun and excitement during your exploration of new types of iris!!




