AIS Region 15 RVP Message

Hello Irisarians,

January was an atmospheric river - raining and especially cold and the cold continues in February with another atmospheric river. The spring and summer cultivars are still waiting for a warmup, but my reblooming irises are blooming right now. Currently, I have 'Gene Machine,' 'Concertina' and 'Orangelo' blooming right now and 'Desert Roundelay' and 'Faithful' are now sending up stalks.

I was going to report on the outcome of putting ice and ice water on 'Lady Jean.' 'Lady Jean' bloomed in October last year and I looked back at my records. Normally, it bloomed in November or December, so the ice did have an effect. You could experiment and add ice to a reblooming cultivar in the summer and see when it blooms if you keep records.

This year, the AIS is offering a special. If you join or upgrade your AIS membership (at the full membership rate), they will send you a certificate for membership in a section or cooperating society - your choice!

This year's AIS Convention will be hosted by the Iris Society of Dallas, April 12-16, 2023. It will be in a historic town, Grapevine, Texas, and will be occurring before our next Spring Trek.

Please look on the AIS website, under conventions, for more information.

Now, the Trek Wheel.

Inland will commit to the Spring Trek in 2024. Tucson will not commit to the Fall Trek in 2024. Sun Country will not commit to the Spring Trek in 2025 or 2026, since they only have one garden right now. So now we will have to find a club to commit to the Fall Trek in 2024, and a club to commit to the Spring Trek in 2025. I am notifying the clubs in advance of this year's Spring Trek meeting, so you will be able to go to your Board and ask if they are willing to host a Trek. If not, we will have to decide what to do with future Treks.

AIS Judges Training

Hello Region 15! I hope you are keeping warm and dry in this long, cold, and wet winter. As I write this, it is 37 degrees outside. It may not seem like it, but spring is just around the corner. With all this rain, I am looking forward to a beautiful and bountiful spring bloom season! The wildflower fields should be in peak bloom soon; the irises

ready (fingers crossed) for the iris shows, treks and sales.

Congratulations! The AIS Board approved the advancement of two apprentices to G/E and two students to apprenticeship. Likewise, the Region now has 5 judges certified for Artistic Design. If you are interested in becoming an Artistic Design judge, let me know. The requirements for certification are in this issue, on the Region 15 website and in the judges handbook.

The Region has 20 G/E Judges, 7 Master Judges, 1 Emeritus Judge, 5 Artistic Design Judges, 3 Apprentices, and 9 students.

Region 15 is in need of more judges! I encourage Region 15 members to sign up in the Judge's Training Program. It is both fun and educational. Anyone may enter the Judge's Training Program by filling out an application form, which is at the Region 15 website: <u>region15ais.org</u>. Please make sure that you immediately become an AIS member, since membership is a requirement for all persons in the training program. When a student signs an application for the training program, the student will have three years to obtain the 10 hours of training. I keep track of student hours and fill out advancement reports in the fall. While students are not required to submit activity reports, it is a good habit to develop as you will be required to report your training hours as a judge.

Judges and students, please take advantage of training sessions offered in your area, during the regional treks and meetings, and at the national conventions. Visit as many iris gardens as you can this spring and attend JT sessions when available, either in person or online. AIS JT Webinars on Zoom are offered periodically. Past AIS JT Webinars are available to view for free on the AIS YouTube Channel. Don't forget to keep track of your activities and be ready to send your reports in August.

I have approved the following JT sessions: "How to Put on an Iris Show," February 7, 2023 in Riverside, CA for 1.5 hrs credit (IRIS); "Grooming and Exhibiting in the Iris Show," March 7, 2023 in Phoenix, AZ for 1.0 hr credit (SCIS); "Spuria Irises," March 12, 2023 in Lakeside, CA for 1.0 hr credit (SDIS); and "Artistic Design," April 4, 2023 in Phoenix, AZ (SCIS).

Please take note of your AIS membership expiry dates. All judges, accredited or in training, are required to be current AIS members. Check your AIS membership at <u>www.irises.org/web-based-lookup/</u>.

Thank you HDIDS for hosting the well-attended Region 15 Fall Meeting. The program was great, the food delicious, the company delightful. Mason and I likewise enjoyed visiting the different gardens and numerous museums at the Huntington after the meeting.

I look forward to seeing you at the Region 15 Spring Trek hosted by the San Fernando Valley Iris Society. I plan to attend the AIS National Convention in Grapevine, TX, so I will likely see you there, too.

Wishing you all a gorgeous iris bloom season this spring!

APPOINTMENT OF ARTISTIC DESIGN JUDGES

AIS Handbook for Judges and Show Officials, Edition 8.22, Chapter 1, Pages 7-8

GUIDELINES FOR CERTIFICATION AS ARTISTIC DESIGN JUDGE

A person interested in becoming certified as an artistic design judge should notify the appropriate regional AIS judges training chair and ask about the region's policies regarding this category of judge.

To qualify for this certification, the person must already be an AIS accredited judge. In some cases, an AIS member with vast experience in artistic design or with other floral certifications may qualify for this certification. Eligibility will be determined by the regional AIS judges training chair.

The person must have the current edition of the *AIS Handbook for Judges and Show Officials* in order to study the chapter on Artistic Design.

Training hours required:

- One hour covering Principles of Design, Chapter 27 in the AIS Handbook.
- One hour covering the Scale of Points, Chapter 27 in the AIS Handbook.
- Two hours of instruction that cover the rest of Chapter 27 in the AIS Handbook.
- Two hours of apprenticeship, watching judging of artistic designs at a show.
- Two hours of actual hands-on designing with a design judge (AIS or National Council of State Garden Clubs) or proof of winning a Best Design of Show or a Best of Design Sweepstakes.

Tests given at training sessions must be passed and reported to their regional AIS judges training chair.

An activity report must be completed on a yearly basis until all requirements are met. There is no time limit for completing the eight hours of training. The RVPs will collect the activity report information and pass it along to the appropriate regional AIS judges training chair in a process similar to other judge categories (G/E. master. etc.)

Once a certificate is issued for AIS artistic design judge has been given, nothing else is required unless the Principles of Design change, which is unlikely.

APPOINTMENT OF ARTISTIC DESIGN JUDGES

AIS Handbook for Judges and Show Officials, Edition 8.22, Chapter 1, Pages 8-9

GUIDELINES FOR BEING GRANDFATHERED IN AS AN ARTISTIC DESIGN JUDGE

Any AIS judge or other floral society member judge may be grandfathered in as an AIS artistic design judge if specific requirements have been met. Being a florist may or may not qualify. Qualification will depend on how familiar the person is with the chapter on Artistic Design (Chapter 27, edition 8.0), in the *AIS Handbook for Judges*, especially when specific florist design techniques are not in line with the principles outlined in Chapter 27.

A person interested in being grandfathered in as an artistic design judge should notify the appropriate regional AIS judges training chair and ask about the region's policies regarding this category of judge.

The person must have the current edition of the *AIS Handbook for Judges and Show Officials* and be familiar with the chapter on Artistic Design (Chapter 27 in Edition 8.0), specifically the Artistic Design Point Scale. A written statement that verifies this requirement will be requested by the regional AIS judges training chair.

To demonstrate love of judging design, the regional AIS judges training chair will request proof of the person's record of judging artistic design shows, leading design training sessions, attending design training sessions, awards for Best Design of Show or artistic sweepstakes, or other relevant activities.

The person may be contacted by an AIS judge or the regional judges training chair to answer other questions before being grandfathered in as an artistic design judge.

Once a certificate for AIS artistic design judge has been given, nothing else is required unless the Principles of Design change, which is unlikely.

Minutes from Spring Board Meeting, April 22, 2022 - motion to approve as amended by Cheryl Deaton and seconded by Sue Brown. Motion approved.

Treasurer's Report for 2022 – Cheryl Deaton

The report is pending audit. Sue Brown motioned for approval. Mason Train seconded the motion.

Judges Training Report – Beth Train

We have 18 G/E judges, 7 Master judges, 1 Emeritus judge, 3 apprentices (2 recommended for advancement to G/E) and 10 students (2 recommended for advancement to apprentice, one moved to TX). Upcoming judges trainings: November 1st in Riverside, CA by Mason Train (IRIS) on "Artistic Design, Container-Grown Iris and Single Blossom entries." November 5th in Scottsdale, AZ by Dawn Boyer (SCIS) on Artistic Design - 4 hours credit (2 hours each for lecture and hands-on).

Membership Report – Mason Train: 36+ members gained with AIS promotion.

Youth Report - Cheryl Deaton: we need more youth - her grandson is aging out.

- Editor Report Olga Batalov: All reports due by mid-March 2023.
- Historian Report Sue Brown: We need pictures and newsletters to be emailed to Sue.

Affiliate Reports:

- <u>Hi Desert Iris & Daylily Society</u> Sue Brown Iris sale in October had few customers. Need to remind people to remember that irises are drought tolerant.
- <u>Inland Region Iris Society</u> Beth Train Also reported fewer customers at the sale, so leftovers were potted and half will go to the Spring sale. They will host the Spring trek on 4/20/2024.
- <u>Lompoc Valley Iris Society</u> Struggling with membership but officers will be elected. 15 irises were donated to a high school horticulture club.
- <u>Orange County Iris & Daylily Club</u> Lois Farr A small number of members are keeping the club alive and happy, following traditions and maintaining meetings.
- <u>Prescott Area Iris Society</u> Sales are good, monsoon rains, earned \$6400 including silent auction. They will restart education in the college this spring 2023. In the Sculpture Garden, 300-450 irises were planted. Tasco donated over 150 cultivars, which were planted at the garden. They have 99 members.
- San Diego Iris Society Hosted the Spring Trek. Fall sale is 2 weekends, Saturdays were busy but Sundays were not. They will have an auction in October, master gardener presentation in November, party in December and program on Artistic Design in January.
- San Fernando Valley Iris Society Cheryl Deaton shared about the upcoming 2023 Spring Trek. The hotel will be in Warner Center, Woodland Hills, and registrations will be approximately \$100-125 per person, with \$179 for the hotel. More information will be made available at the next board meeting in January 2023.
- Southern California Iris Society The club was kicked out of their current location due to remodel. They are using Zoom for their meetings. A Holiday party is planned and the first sale since Covid is also coming this year. The club is also reaching out to the homeless.
- No reports from Sun Country Iris Society or Tucson Area Iris Society.
- Spring Trek discussion San Diego Iris Society's expenses for the 2022 Spring Trek were \$2500 over income. There were 50 attendees.
- National Convention Basket Each club is to send \$25 for the AIS basket (for a total of \$250 from our region) by January 7th, 2023. Motion by Lucie George, seconded by Sue Brown.
- Meeting was adjourned at 10:25 am motioned by Cheryl Deaton, seconded by Sue Brown. The winter board meeting will be on Saturday January 7, 2023 at 9 am via Zoom. Please send Debbie James the link.

Budget for 2023 - Cheryl Deaton

The spreadsheet of the proposed budget 2023 was shared online. 




Tucson Area Iris Society Report


