

Hello Region 15! It has been a long, hot summer and I'm ready for the cool, crisp autumn air. How did your garden fair in these triple digit temperatures?

Thank you Inland Region Iris Society for hosting the AIS Region 15 Spring Trek last April 25-26. The guest irises at The Gardens at Wild Oak Farms were in full bloom. The attendees' time in the garden was cut short by a noontime downpour. It worked out great that there were several lectures and another classroom JT to fill in the time until the rain stopped.

By this time, the affiliates should have received the Region 15 trek guest iris rhizomes for their auction/ sale to benefit Region 15. I hope you will be as generous as you were at last year's auction fundraisers. Many thanks to the hybridizers and the affiliates for supporting the region.

Mason and I attended the AIS National Convention in Billings, MT. It was one of the biggest AIS convention we've attended as there were about 450 registrants. The six guest gardens were in peak bloom. It was wonderful and overwhelming at the same time. One or two gardens had the irises planted too closely together such that it was difficult and time-consuming to search for the labels. Other than that, plenty of delicious food, informative programs, and the wonderful and friendly people all made for a great convention. There were 16 Region 15 affiliate members (maybe 18?) at the event.

Cara Hutchings, the Region 2 archivist, emailed me last May. The Region 2 Library is downsizing and they have several hard copies of the Region 15 Newsletter. Sue Brown and I determined that these are issues that we don't have in our files nor on the region website. It worked out that Cara was going to the convention and was willing to bring the newsletters with her so the three of us met in Billings. I am in the process of scanning the newsletters (the oldest was March 1963!) so they can be uploaded to the website. Sue will keep the printed copies in our physical library and will tell you more about them in her historian report at the Fall Meeting.

Watch out for the AIS Popularity Poll this November. This will be online and will replace the Tall Bearded Symposium (not to be confused with the TBIS Symposium). All named irises, bearded or beardless, and in any iris class may be written as your top 25 favorite irises.

The Region 15 Fall Meeting in Palmdale, CA will be hosted by the Hi Desert Iris and Daylily Society. I plan to attend. I am looking forward to hearing Michael Kowalchyk's program. It would be interesting to know the novel ideas of the younger generation of iris lovers. I hope to see you on October 18th.

Region 15 Spring Board Meeting Minutes

AIS REGION 15 SPRING BOARD MEETING

Friday, April 25, 2025, 7 pm Yucaipa, CA

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm

Welcome and Introductions by Beth Train, Region 15 RVP.

The motion to approve the Winter (January 18, 2025) Board Meeting Minutes was made by Cheryl Deaton, seconded by Sue Brown. Vote taken, motion carried.

OFFICER REPORTS

- <u>Treasurer Report</u> Cheryl Deaton: no expenses since Christmas. She just rolled over the \$6000 CD. Another CD at 4.7% interest rate will mature in October; any other CDs will roll over as well. Earnings from the sale of AIS Region 15 rhizomes did well last year. She is hoping for good rhizomes and sales this year. *Report is on page 13*.
- <u>Judges Training Report</u> Mary Hanson: a total of 23 judges including 3 emeritus, 6 master judges and 14 garden/ exhibition judges. There are also 9 certified artistic design and 10 student judges. There have been five judges training sessions two tomorrow, the other 3 are in Arizona in May and June. Pay attention to your membership AIS expiration and keep track of your JT hours. The judges annual Activity Reports will be due soon send them to Mary Hanson.
- Membership Report Mason Train: There is a new AIS Membership Drive: \$10 for a full one-year membership (compared to \$45). Any new member or someone whose membership has lapsed for more than a year is eligible for the Membership Drive. The 2025 AIS Membership Drive will run from March 1st to November 1st and will include the Basic Iris Culture book. The 2025 AIS Membership Drive is limited to 750 new memberships. So far, there are 10 new members in southern CA and 3 in AZ. The AIS website provides a flyer which you can send out for publicity. Ask your new members to fill out both the club and AIS membership form at the same time.
- The San Fernando Valley Iris Society is paying the \$10 fee for all new SFVIS members who qualify for the Membership Drive. They have added approximately 10 new members. The Inland Region Iris Society has a drawing at every club meeting for a free one-year AIS membership (print or e-membership).
- <u>Awards Report</u> Claire Schneider: Hybridizers currently receive a \$25 check for winning an award. **Motion**: That the awards be increased from \$25 to \$50, taking effect at the Spring Trek 2026. Motion made by Claire Schneider, seconded by Mason Train motion passed.

Youth Report - Cheryl Deaton: Currently, Region 15 has 5 youth members. We need more!

Editor Report - Olga is not here but she thanks you for your timely submissions!

<u>Historian Report</u> - Sue Brown: anything in paper goes in the file box. Sue has been trying to print electronic documents and then saving both versions.

AFFILIATE REPORTS

- <u>Hi Desert Iris and Daylily Society</u> Pat Simpson: 34 members, 12 AIS members. The spring show is next weekend. Irises have been blooming for a month, with new stalks coming up. They have weeding parties and are completely redoing the nursery. Hosting the Fall Meeting on October 18 is going to be exciting.
- <u>Inland Region Iris Society</u> Beth Train: Welcome to the Spring Trek. The club has worked hard to bring you beautiful guest irises in bloom and a full schedule of events. Rain is predicted for around 11 am tomorrow. There is a potted iris sale at the Elks Lodge in Riverside this weekend, so a third of our active members are doing the sales while the rest of us are attending this trek.

Orange County Iris and Daylily Club - Lois Farr: membership is declining.

- San Diego Iris Society Mary Hanson: It's been a great year. We have 51 families, 76 individuals. The Spring Show is the first weekend of May in Balboa Park, where we will also sell potted plants. Publicity is through social media, branching out to Twitter and Instagram. In June, we will present the awards from the spring show. Claire will give a program on judging irises in Europe. The 2027 Spring Trek will be April 16-17.
- San Fernando Valley Iris Society Andi Rivarola: At their spring show, there were 38 artistic designs. Best of show was won by 'Voluminous,' a white TB introduced by George Sutton. They had a sale on Saturday, which went very well. There will be a Beardless Iris mini show with spuria and Louisiana irises at the May meeting. Judging will be by an informal vote. Irises are set up on tables, then the attendees vote by pen and paper. This is very popular. The June meeting is a potluck with awards and elections. They go dark in July. In August, Jill Bonino will present a slide

show. September will be an auction of \$1400 worth of irises. November will be Bingo night - play for irises prizes. December will be a holiday party!

Southern California Iris Society - Cheryl Deaton: Brian continues to be president and meetings are by Zoom. Irises were sold out at the South Coast Plaza sale - 150 irises sold for a total of \$1400. Thursday was potted iris which sold out, so Brian returned to his Santa Clarita home to dig more.

Sun Country Iris Society - Sharon Petterson: The SCIS group is having a great time with many new members. She invited the trek attendees to come to Phoenix next year for the 2026 Spring Trek. There are 3 gardens, buses, and 3 meals included for \$100. The guest speaker is Bonnie Nichols, who will give garden judges training and JT on Novelty iris. The rhizome sales will be in October, and the potted irises were sold in March. The April show had 15 exhibitors and 78 entries. An arilbred won Best in Show. They increased their entries by giving \$20 in credit towards the purchase of irises to every person who entered the show.

Tucson Area Iris Society - Pat Olson: This year, the iris show was held in conjunction with the Rose Society again. This is only the 3rd show, so there is still a lot of learning going on. 12 exhibitors, including 2 first time and 4 new to TAIS - 85 cultivars. They have members' garden walks. May 10th will be their 60th anniversary celebration. October is weeding month in Tucson so we are preparing well ahead for the 2026 Fall Meeting.

OLD BUSINESS

The budget was approved at the Winter Board meeting.

The 2025 AIS Convention in Billings, Montana is sold out at 400 attendees. Instead of donating a gift basket for the silent auction, the AIS Region 15 is donating \$250, \$25 from each affiliate. Each affiliate should mail a check to Cheryl made out to AIS Region 15.

NEW BUSINESS

Donations to AIS: An anonymous donor is asking for matching donations to AIS. This person will match donations dollar for dollar up to a maximum of \$7500. You can choose which fund your donation goes to.

Revision to awards - Claire Schneider: Six awards are given at Spring Trek:

Best Cultivar by a Region 15 hybridizer (Herb Holk Award)

Best Cultivar originating outside of Region 15 (Claire Barr Award)

Best Seedling by a Region 15 hybridizer (Bernard Hamner Award)

Best Seedling originating outside of Region 15

Best Spuria

Best Louisiana

The Cultivar Award does not specify any class of iris. There is no class for Tall Bearded.

Motion #1: The Best Cultivar will be defined as a Tall Bearded iris, taking effect at the 2026 Spring Trek. The two Best Cultivar Awards will be renamed the Herb Holk Award for Best Tall Bearded Iris originating in AIS Region 15 and the Claire Barr Award for Best Tall Bearded Iris originating outside of AIS Region 15. Motion made by Claire Schneider, seconded by Mary Hanson, motion passed.

Motion #2: AIS Region 15 will add two awards to the Spring Trek: Best Arilbred Iris and Best Median Iris (intermediate bearded, border bearded, miniature tall bearded, and standard dwarf bearded), which will take effect at the 2026 Spring Trek. Motion made by Claire Schneider, seconded by Mary Hanson, motion passed.

Motion #3: The Best Median Iris Award will be named the Tom Craig Award. He was a significant hybridizer who lived in Escondido, California (Region 15). Motion made by Claire Schneider, seconded by Mason Train, motion passed.

Motion #4: The Best Arilbred Iris Award will be named the Rick Tasco Award. He is a significant hybridizer who lived in Phoenix, AZ (Region 15). Motion made by Claire Schneider, seconded by Sue Brown, motion passed.

Revisions to JT application form - Andi Rivarola made a motion for following revisions to the application form for the judges training program, seconded by Mason Train, motion passed.

- "Application for Entrance" to "Application for Admittance"
- Update yes or no questions to checkboxes, with no wrong answers.
- Question 1: from "Do you have the latest copy of the Judges Handbook?" to "Have you downloaded the latest copy of the Judges Handbook?"

- Remove Question 6: "Have you been the announced speaker on the subject of iris before an organized group?"

- Revise Question 13 from "Have you assumed the responsibility for increasing the membership of the American Iris Society?" To "Have you HELPED INCREASE the membership of the American Iris Society?"
- Revise Question 14 to "Have you participated actively in an iris group on social media?"
- Revise Question 15 to "Have you served as a volunteer at an iris show?"
- Remove Question 16: "Have you managed an iris show or iris specimen section of a show?"
- Remove Question 17: "Have you participated actively in a specialty iris group recognized by the AIS?"
- Remove Question 18: "Have you raised seedlings from your own iris crosses?"
- Remove Question 19: "Have you registered or introduced an iris?"
- Revise Question 20: "Would you be willing to judge an iris show anywhere within your own AIS Region boundaries, knowing that this activity is a gratuitous service?"

The AIS has cancelled the Tall Bearded Symposium for 2025. Instead, there will be an online Popularity Poll. People may vote for their top 25 Favorite Irises. Voting will open in November.

Meeting adjourned at 8:20 pm.

NEW GARDEN AWARDS ADDED TO AIS REGION 15 SPRING TREKS

Six garden awards are given at AIS Region 15 spring treks. They are:

- Herb Holk Award (Best Cultivar by an AIS Region 15 hybridizer)
- Claire Barr Award (Best Cultivar from outside AIS Region 15)
- Bernard Hamner Award (Best seedling by an AIS Region 15 hybridizer)
- ♣ Best Iris Seedling Award (from a seedling from outside AIS Region 15)
- AIS Region 15 Spring Trek Best Spuria Cultivar
- AIS Region 15 Spring Trek Best Louisiana Cultivar

After viewing the irises in the Spring Trek gardens, attendees fill out a ballot for the six garden awards. The ballots are tallied and the winners are announced at the end of the meeting.

Requests for bearded iris cultivars are sent to hybridizers two years before a spring trek event. Requests for beardless iris cultivars are sent three years before. Most of the bearded iris rhizomes sent by hybridizers have been tall bearded, even though the request could include invitations for the arilbred and median classes of iris. Median and arilbred irises grow very well in AIS Region 15, yet we see very few of them in the Spring Trek gardens. The medians are the border bearded (BB), intermediate bearded (IB), miniature tall bearded (MTB), and standard dwarf bearded (SDB) irises. Something needed to change to entice hybridizers to send cultivars from these other classes.

After much discussion at their April 25, 2025 Spring Board meeting, the AIS Region 15 Board of Directors approved four motions dealing with the Spring Trek garden awards. The names of the Herb Holk and Claire Barr Awards were changed, two awards were added, and the size of the prizes was increased from \$25 to \$50. This is now the list of garden awards for AIS Region 15 spring treks, beginning with the 2026 Spring Trek.

Awards with new names

Herb Holk Award for the **best tall bearded iris** by an AIS Region 15 hybridizer Claire Barr Award for the **best tall bearded iris** from outside of AIS Region 15

Unchanged awards

Bernard Hamner Award for the best seedling by an AIS Region 15 hybridizer Best Seedling Award for a seedling from outside of AIS Region 15 AIS Region 15 Spring Trek Best Spuria Cultivar AIS Region 15 Spring Trek Best Louisiana Cultivar

New awards

Rick Tasco Award for the best arilbred iris

Tom Craig Award for the best median iris, where median refers to BB, IB, miniature tall bearded (MTB), and standard dwarf bearded (SDB) irises


We hope these changes to the AIS Region 15 awards will promote the planting and show of median and arilbred irises. However, because of the two and three years needed for rhizomes to become flowering clumps, we probably won't see an increase in the number of median and arilbred irises in the AIS Region 15 Spring Trek gardens until 2027. We do look forward to seeing them! They add beauty to the garden, while extending the bloom season.

Recording Rebloom Data

Why do you grow reblooming irises? Easy to answer: to extend the season of iris flowers in your garden. You want to see irises blooming in the garden for months and months!! Every spring we search iris websites and study iris catalogs looking to purchase those irises that rebloom and sadly, we don't find very many. One problem is that hybridizers do not always know that their cultivar reblooms. Irises are registered as spring bloom, yet in some parts of the USA they rebloom. How can you know which irises rebloom? And in which part of the country do they rebloom? We need a system to collect and publish current rebloom data. Luckily, the Reblooming Iris Society (RIS) is doing just that. However, to have as complete a record as possible, they need YOUR rebloom data!

There are many methods for recording bloom data. You could write bloom information on a clipboard, on a calendar, or in a small spiral notebook. I use a garden diary because it fits into my tool bag. The tool bag travels everywhere in the garden with me, which means I can record information immediately in my garden diary. When a particular cultivar is blooming or has set seed or appears sickly, I pull out the diary and make a note. Also, I am able to record other events and observations such as the date fertilizer was applied, when I divided 'Joseph's Mantle' (T. Craig 1949, TB & RE) or where a particular gopher was caught. The disadvantage of recording bloom data this way is trying to see the big picture. Unless you go through the diary page by page, how do you know if 'Mesmerizer' (M. Byers 1991, TB RE) rebloomed? As handy and accurate as the diary is, it isn't very efficient. My solution is to use both a diary and a spreadsheet. I keep track of growth and bloom in the diary, then transfer that information to a spreadsheet on my laptop. Now when I want to know about 'Mesmerizer,' I can look it up, year by year.



GARDEN DIARY

I use a mini-binder (**Figure 1**), a 9 by 7 inch three-ring binder with one page for each month. This half-size binder easily fits into my garden tool bag. Information for one month is written on a sheet of regular printer paper, 8.5 by 11 inches that folds into the binder.

I created a template (Figure 2) so that each time I need another month, I open the template, change the month, and print. The front side has three categories, the back side is blank, leaving plenty of space to write bloom information. I usually print three months at a time. Three holes are punched at the top of the page to hold it in the binder.

There are three category topics on the front page. (1) CLIMATE EVENTS & other observations. includes information such as storm rainfall totals, daytime high



temps, nighttime low temps, damage by rabbits, etc. Other information that goes here are things like order another irrigation timer, fixed hole in the fence of north garden, and Ceanothus is blooming. The next topic is (2) TREATMENTS such as fertilizers, setting gopher traps, and mosquito dunks applied to troughs. Last is the (3) WORK RECORD, such as dividing in the historic garden, planting iris or tomatoes, pulling weeds, pruning roses, building another rock wall, and so on.

Bloom records are written on the back side of the page. The Reblooming Iris Society's system for recording bloom is easy. E for early in the month, M for middle, and L for late. Early would be the 1st to 10th of the month, middle is 11th through the 20th, and late is the 21st to the end of the month. I group my blooms into their classes, which makes it easier to enter the data into the spreadsheet.

Currently there are three years of pages in my garden diary, which makes it easy to look back to see what I did a year ago during a particular month. For example, I can see that I fertilized the Louisiana irises in May 2024 and June 2023. According to my garden diary, the first leaves of the dormant spuria poked through the soil in October 2023 and in late September 2024. I pruned roses in December 2024, January 2024 and 2023. Yes, I keep notes on all my plants, not just the irises.



Your bloom record will tell which cultivars rebloom in your garden. To actually see the rebloom easily, your bloom data should be entered into a spreadsheet for the entire year (**Figure 4**). This is easy to do using the RIS system of E, M, and L. (I was out of town during April and didn't collect any data. No problem, the RIS can use bloom data from the other months.)

From my bloom record of 2024, you can see that 'Concertina' (G. Sutton 2000. IB & RE) and 'Crimson King' (Barr & Sons 1893, IB) have been wonderful reblooming irises in MY garden. But could they rebloom in YOUR garden? Look in the AIS Iris Encyclopedia (the wiki) to see that 'Concertina' is registered as a reblooming iris. Because the wiki has been adding rebloom data, now you can see exactly WHERE it has been reported to rebloom.

Now look in the AIS Iris Encyclopedia (the wiki) for 'Crimson King' and you will see that it is not registered as a reblooming iris. It has an early bloom, but is not a rebloomer. However, reports of rebloom for 'Crimson King' have been added to the wiki, which means you can see places where 'Crimson King' does rebloom.

SUBMITTING YOUR REBLOOM DATA

The Reblooming Iris Society (RIS) publishes an annual report of rebloom. Your bloom and rebloom information would be a valuable addition to that report. If you haven't been keeping bloom records, now is the time to start. Write your bloom information on a sheet of paper, on your wall calendar, in a spiral notebook, or in a garden diary. If you already have a system for keeping bloom records, all the better. At the end of the year, compile your bloom data into a spreadsheet or onto a sheet of paper.
