

AIS Judges Training

Hello to Region 15! I hope everyone is staying healthy and keeping safe. We are still in the midst of the Covid19 pandemic but with widespread vaccination we are having less restrictive mandates. This is welcome news to everyone, especially us iris lovers who enjoy visiting each other's gardens and going to iris conventions.

As with 2020, the AIS Board of Directors are waiving training hours requirements for 2021. Not every state in the country are doing well with their Covid19 control. Judges are still required to send in their activity reports, however. This year, judges will have to vote the AIS Awards, too.

The Board of Directors for the American Iris Society has appointed Cheryl Deaton as Emeritus Judge at its December 2020 meeting. This honor is given to judges who have given outstanding service to AIS. Congratulations Cheryl!

As of this writing, the Region has 18 G/E Judges, 7 Master Judges, 1 Emeritus Judge, 2 Apprentices, and 14 students. One of the students will be recommended for advancement in the Fall. She has completed the requirements and I have received letters of recommendation for her. We lost (Master Judge) Dr. Ed Murray, who passed last year. Another judge moved to OR and is now with Region 13.

I encourage Region 15 members to sign up in the Judge's Training Program. It is both fun and educational. Anyone may enter the Judge's Training Program by filling out an application form, which is at the Region 15 website: region15ais.org. It is also in this Spring 2021 Region 15 Bulletin. Please make sure that you immediately become an AIS member, since membership is a requirement for all persons in the training program and all judges. When a student signs an application for the training program, the student will have three years to obtain the 10 hours of training. *"The ten hours of required training must have been completed within the three year period immediately preceding recommendation for appointment as an Apprentice judge."* (p 5, Handbook for Judges and Show Officials). I keep track of student hours and fill out advancement reports in the fall. While students are not required to submit activity reports, it is a good habit to develop as you will be required to report your training hours as a judge.

Are you currently an AIS member? Do you know when your membership lapses? Check your AIS membership on the website: www.aislookup.org. Simply enter your last name, and your membership expiration date will be shown. I will occasionally remind students and even judges if their membership has expired, but it is good practice to know it yourself.

AIS Webinars offer Judges Training sessions periodically. As an AIS member, you should be getting email updates on this. I've recently approved several in-garden and classroom training sessions in CA and AZ. You may contact me to see when training sessions are available in your area.



San Diego Iris Society Report

Welcome Spring!

My iris are growing and multiplying but so far no spring blooms. Due to the state of the pandemic and our color tier, The San Diego Iris Society has chosen to meet virtually. We have been meeting monthly via Zoom. About one third of our pre-pandemic members have been attending. Our programs have been provided by myself and by Olga Batalov. We have learned about the history of plicatas, Region 15 hybridizers, irises with holiday names, the individual process of registering and naming an iris, genetics of broken color iris, and iris fragrance. Since the advent of vaccines, and the change of the seasons, Covid-19 infection numbers have been decreasing. As a result, our board has tentatively planned an all outdoor members-only garden tour. I'm looking forward to see how irises are growing in other gardens.

The San Diego Iris Society was scheduled to host the Spring 2021 trek but due to the pandemic, it has been postponed until 2022. That means that our clumps will be three years old, and it will be delightful to see these large clumps in bloom next year. We are currently planning an in-person trek but for safety and comfort level of the participants and hosts, we are reconsidering some of the details.

I had my college students conduct a ten week long experiment regarding iris growth, comparing performance in native soil and soil amended with peat moss, Epsom salts and mycorrhizae. They collected data on the number of leaves, length of leaves, number of increases, the length and width of the rhizome at the beginning and end of the experiment, as well as the number and length of the roots. In addition, students tested the control and experimental soils for pH, nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium at the start and conclusion of the experiment. The control soil had a neutral to slightly alkaline pH and was deficient in nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. The experimental soil had a slightly acidic pH; nitrogen tested as sufficient, phosphorus was adequate and potassium was in surplus. At the conclusion of the experiment, nitrogen was depleted from the soil from the control, and phosphorus and potassium were deficient or depleted. For the experimental soil, nitrogen was depleted, and phosphorus and potassium were deficient. The pH value did not change. Students concluded that irises use substantial amounts of macronutrients in order to grow. Based on the results of this experiment, one can only conclude: fertilize your irises. For many of my students, this is the first time they have ever grown a plant since elementary school. In addition to allowing students to do science, I'm hoping that a few catch the iris bug and become irisarians. Iris rhizomes were provided by Janis Shackelford and myself for this project. Students will be able to keep their plant at the conclusion of the experiment. This is the second year I have conducted this experiment but last year variables were not well controlled due to the closure of school as a result of the pandemic.

Southern California Iris Society Report


