Note from the Editor

Hello fellow AIS Region 15 members!

It was nice to see some of you at the 2024 Spring Trek in Riverside, CA. There were so many iris in bloom within walking distance of the meeting venue. The only other Spring Trek I had been to was my local one. Unfortunately, I will not able to attend the 2024 Fall Meeting.

It sure has been a strange summer for me - very muggy, cloudy and relatively mild until just recently, since I am a bit closer to the coast than most. I know inland areas had some extreme record-setting or even record-breaking heat this summer, so I hope your gardens are doing okay and bounce back.

I went on a family road trip up the east side of California all the way to the border with Oregon. I did not see any iris but I saw some wild leopard lilies in Lassen National Park. The fires have done major damage to the forests in that area, and some areas show no signs of recovery even three years after the Dixie Fire. Other areas showed

how resilient nature is, as well as how a forest fire can spread so quickly that it sometimes spares a few pockets, mostly the meadows.

Please, please get your reports in on time. I am editor of multiple newsletters on top of work and my other society obligations, so when I set a deadline, please honor it. I have a hard deadline by which I need to mail the printed newsletters, plus the time it takes to print them and the time it takes to make those last minute additions and rearrangements. Rush printing incurs higher costs, and we as a Region need to keep costs down, since our only income is what the affiliate clubs contribute from their rhizome auctions.

AIS Judges Training

Greetings Region 15 iris lovers,

As of July 31, 2024: Region 15 had 26 judges, of which 7 are Master judges and one is an Emeritus judge. 10 judges are also certified as artistic design judges. We have 3 retired judges and 7 active students. On August 22nd, Denise Stine passed away, one of our G/E and artistic judges.

Several judges were dropped from active status due to failure to renew their AIS membership in a timely manner. Maintaining active membership is a requirement to serve as an AIS accredited judge. Several other judges were reminded that 10 hours of Judges training classes, including 2 hours of in-garden training, for G/E judges and 3 hours of training, including 1 hour of in-garden training, for Master judges over a three year period are necessary to maintain status as an AIS accredited judge.

Region 15 offered 13 Judges training opportunities in the 2023-2024 year. 6 were offered by Sun Country Iris Society, 4 were offered by Inland Region Iris Society and one each was offered by Lompoc Valley Iris Society, San Diego Iris Society and Southern California Iris Society in 2024.

Judges, remember, you can give a judges training and it counts toward your judges training hours. If looking for judges training opportunities, attend regional treks and meetings or go to the National Convention.

Two judges trainings have already been approved for the upcoming year: one on November 5th, 2024 on Novelty Irises taught by Beth Train and one at the 2025 Spring Trek on Artistic Design also taught by Beth Train.

Nearly 100% of Region 15 judges voted the official ballot and nearly 100% returned their activity report. One Master judge requested to retire.

Spring 2024 Board Meeting Minutes

AIS REGION 15 SPRING BOARD MEETING

April 20, 2024, 8:45 am

Welcome by Beth Train, RVP, followed by introductions.

- Minutes from the Winter Board Meeting on January 13, 2024 were approved with the correction of High Desert Iris and Daylily Society to Hi Desert Iris and Daylily Society. Mason Train moved that the Minutes be accepted with this correction. Cheryl Deaton seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- Judges Training report by Mary Hanson There are 30 Region 15 judges: 20 G/E, 1 Emeritus, 8 Master and 1 Apprentice Judge. Region 15 also has 3 judges training students.
- Membership Report by Mason Train 216 members including 1 youth, 139 in California and 77 in Arizona. We need to encourage more youth membership. A special opportunity: with full membership to AIS (print and digital), you will receive 2 free youth memberships.
- Awards Report by Claire Schneider Awards have transitioned from plaques to checks. Please vote for your favorite iris today and the winners will be announced during the evening festivities.
- Youth report by Cheryl Deaton We have only 1 youth member, which is beyond sad. It is only \$8 for membership without a print copy of the bulletin and \$12 for membership with a print copy of the bulletin.
- Editor report by Olga Batalov September 1, 2024 is the deadline for all reports to be submitted for the next issue of the regional newsletter.

Historian report by Sue Brown – Sue is still working on archiving printed reports.

Ways and Means – no report

Affiliate Reports:

- Hi Desert Iris and Daylily Society Sue Brown On Saturday, 4/27/2024, there will be a sale at the Palmdale Elks Lodge of both potted and rhizome iris. Future sales will include day lilies and arilbred irises.
- Inland Region Iris Society Beth Train Riverside Community Flower Show and Garden Tours are 4/27 4/28/2024. Potted irises will be available for sale.
- Lompoc Valley Iris Society Cindy Martin Their pop-up sale in the spring was at the Lavender Farm. It rained but was successful. They held a garden show open to the public. July 27, 2024 will be their rhizome sale.
- Orange County Iris and Daylily Club Derry Gerald The club has low membership attendance due to the poor health of its members. \$25 donation for the AIS convention basket still needs to be sent.
- Prescott Area Iris Society No one present. Their meeting is today
- San Diego Iris Society Claire Schneider May 4 and 5 is the Spring Show at Casa del Prado in Balboa Park, admission is free. June 9, 2024 is the awards meeting complete with ice cream and election of new officers. SDIS does not meet in the summer. August 24 and 25, 2024 is their rhizome sale. The club meets on the second Sunday of the month, except October of 2024 because of the Region 15 fall meeting when they will meet on the third Sunday, October 20.
- San Fernando Valley Iris Society Jill Bonino for Andi Rivarola They had a show on the first weekend in April. The blooms are late so there were few entries.
- Southern California Iris Society Brian Moon Their show was last week. 'Mind Blowing' won Best of Show. There were 8 artistic exhibits. All are invited to attend club meetings at the LA County Arboretum, with free admission on the fourth Saturday of the month. On the last weekend in April, Thursday to Sunday, the club will be at the Crystal Court in South Coast Plaza selling iris rhizomes. Last year, they sold out by mid-Friday.
- Sun Country Iris Society (Phoenix, AZ) Sharon Petterson Last weekend was their show at a nursery. There were 58 horticulture entries and 11 artistic entries. They had two sets of judges. Kathy Chilton attended. Best of Show was 'You're So Veined,' Best Seedling by Francelle Edwards, Best Spuria: "No Mas Dinero" by Charles Jenkins. They sold out of the potted irises. At another sale, 150 rhizomes were sold in one hour. Sales in the fall were very strong. Three judges' trainings were held in northern Sedona, Payson and Forest Lakes, which all have different seasons due to the different elevations. Meetings are the first Tuesdays of the month, except July which is a vacation month. There will be an ice cream party in August. They have no youth members at this time.
- Tucson Area Iris Society Kathy Chilton Their Iris Show and Sale was today in conjunction with the Rose Society of Tucson. The club is not showing interest at the regional or national levels.




And then came some hard work... digging, dividing and selling rhizomes, and potting about 500 more rhizomes for next spring's sale. Whew!
