## Note from the Editor

Hello fellow AIS Region 15 members!

Welcome to spring! This year brings with it a lot of rain to southern California, fortunately not as much as in northern California but definitely wetter than we typically get. At my house, as of March 5th, we have had 8.3 inches of rain since the start of 2024 (with more coming down

now) and 11.6 inches since last August. It was reasonably spread out too, possibly enough to trigger a good wildflower bloom in the deserts and likely enough for another spectacular poppy bloom. The cacti are already covered in buds, and some even bloomed as early as February. I know those of you to the north of us here in San Diego got a lot more rain, with hopefully minimal to no long-term damage. Similarly, I hope those of you in Arizona are unscathed. May your iris bloom be exceptional this year - I hope you fertilized before the rains!

As some of you may be aware, I recently took over as AIS exhibition schedules chair, which puts me in charge of approving the show schedules for all of the iris societies in the US (and Canada too apparently). I am happy to see that six of our ten affiliate clubs have approved shows, which is about 10% of the nationwide count thus far. Please consider the overlapping time commitment this has with the Region 15 spring newsletter deadline and submit your reports for this newsletter on-time, or better yet early if possible, next spring.

I hope to make it to the Region 15 spring trek this year, barring unforeseeable circumstances. If you are like me and do not drive, ask around your club to see if you could carpool with someone. The 2024 Spring Trek is only one day and a relatively short drive for most of you in California, maybe even doable in one day without needing a hotel. It is your chance to see newer cultivars in bloom, as well as to mingle and socialize (yes, even us introverts) with like-minded iris enthusiasts.

# **AIS Judges Training**

Greetings Region 15 iris lovers,

We have had some unusual weather this winter. We had a rare tornado warning in San Diego County. The funnel cloud never touched down to become a tornado. We have had multiple atmospheric rivers bring plenty of rain leading to local flooding. For a few days my bearded iris, planted in raised beds were flooded. Hopefully the rain will produce a beautiful spring bloom season.

Region 15 has already held three judges trainings this year. Sun Country Iris Society held a training on February 6th. Dale Liggett of Sun Country Iris Society held a training on plicata iris bloom patterns. Also on February 6th, Inland Region Iris Society judge Beth Train held a training on Iris terminology and color patterns (1.5 hour). The San Diego Iris Society hosted Bonnie Nichols to speak about novelty iris. In the upcoming months, several more judges training opportunities have been approved. On April 6th, Sun Country Iris Society will be hosting an in-garden training presented by Denise Stine in which the blooming iris will serve as examples for vocabulary. The training will take place in Ardi Kary's garden. On May 11th, Nancy will present on Spuria and Louisiana iris at Darol's garden. On June 8th, Dale Liggett will presents a training on collections in the iris show. Trainings listed are classroom unless designated as garden and will earn 1 hour of credit unless otherwise noted.

Region 15 currently has 4 retired judges, 1 Emeritus/Artistic Design judge, 6 Master judges, 2 Master/ Artistic Design judges, 13 Garden-Exhibition Judges, 6 Garden-Exhibition/Artistic Judges and 1 apprentice judge. Region 15 also has 3 judges training students.

I encourage our members to become a judge. I am a relatively new judge. I started in October of 2018 and become a garden-exhibition judge in January of 2023. I have learned many interesting facts about growing and showing iris. The requirements are reasonable. Become and maintain an AIS membership. Complete an application to become a student. Over the course of three years, attend and pass the exam for ten training sessions. Once the requirements as a student are complete, you become an apprentice where, in addition to classroom and garden trainings, you get to be tutored by four certified judges. Two of those tutoring sessions will be in the garden and two will be at iris shows. Becoming a judge has helped me become a better iris gardener.

## Tall Bearded 2023 Symposium Results sorted for AIS Region 15

The Tall Bearded Iris Symposium (hereafter called Symposium) is a popularity contest held once a year. The tall bearded irises included on the Symposium ballot are the 100 top cultivars from last year's Symposium, the irises eligible for last year's Dykes Medal and Wister Medals, the irises eligible for last year's Awards of Merit, and the irises eligible for Honorable Mentions in the year before last year. For 2023, the total number of registered tall bearded irises on the Ballot was 480.

The Symposium Ballot is posted online and is usually included in *IRISES: The Bulletin*. Anyone can vote the Symposium ballot - AIS members and non-members, AIS judges and non-judges. It is a popularity contest. The 100 irises with the most votes collected from the USA and Canada are listed as Symposium winners in The Bulletin, usually in the winter issue.

Over the years, I have planted many of the Symposium winners. However, most have done poorly in my southern California garden. They had no flower stalks, no increases, and died. Thinking I might be doing something wrong, I have planted these so-called top cultivars several times, growing them in different places, with different sunlight and irrigation and had the same results: pitiful!! But wait a minute!! Southern California, in AIS Region 15, has its own horticultural properties. The top irises from the Symposium have received the most votes in the USA and Canada. I should be looking for the top irises in AIS Region 15. Thanks to Janis Shackelford, here they are: the top tall bearded irises from Region 15.

Region 15: Southern California, Arizona

Voting: Thirteen people cast 252 votes

Top irises 'Bottle Rocket' = 8 votes 'Blinded by the Light' = 6 'Mesmerizer' = 6 'Belle Fille' = 5 'Boundless' = 5 'That's All Folks' = 5 'Autumn Explosion' = 4 'Don't Doubt Dalton' = 4 'Glitter Gulch' = 4 'Notta Lemon' = 4



About the data: only 13 people from AIS Region 15 voted on the 2023 Symposium Ballot, which is to say the results probably are not very reliable. Nevertheless, each person who voted must have had a good experience with the cultivars for which they cast votes. So, regardless of reliability, you might consider planting some of them. And next year, I hope that you'll consider voting the 2024 Symposium Ballot. It will be available online and anyone can vote. The results would make a more reliable tool if more people voted. Don't you want to know which cultivars do best in AIS Region 15?

# The "Iris of the Year" for 2024

**The American Iris Society** (AIS) is pleased to announce its "Iris of the Year" for 2024: tall bearded iris 'Don't Doubt Dalton.' This outstanding iris is the result of hybridizing work conducted by plant breeder Tom Burseen of Grand Prairie, Texas. He introduced 'Don't Doubt Dalton' to the public through his commercial iris garden in 2015. Tom named this iris for a friend's grandson who rides bulls. Tom is known for his tall bearded iris hybrids with unusual names. He received the AIS Hybridizer Award in 2022.



#### About 'Don't Doubt Dalton'

The Iris Encyclopedia describes this iris as having early to late bloom; its standards (top petals) pure white with random redpurple splattering; style arms (center of flower) white, washed gold; falls (bottom petals) pure white, yellow-gold washed hafts (top portions of falls), random dark purple splatters; beards poppy orange with tattered and feathered white horns; flared and ruffled; slight sweet fragrance.

When asked to describe his iris, originator Tom Burseen said "Don't Doubt Dalton' grows and blooms profusely, and is not only a color breaker (describing the unusual splatters of a different color on the solid color background) but a space ager also." A "space ager" has a horn, spoon, or flounce appendage at the end of the "beard" on the fall. These are uncommon additions to a bearded iris flower. The combination of broken color and a horn appendage is highly unusual and 'Don't Doubt Dalton' is the first American Dykes Medal winner to display both.

#### Additional AIS Garden Awards

Tall bearded irises are judged chiefly of their qualities as perennial garden plants, with more emphasis on strong growth characteristics and disease resistance than on mere beauty and distinctiveness of the flower. Judges accredited by the AIS cast votes that resulted in 'Don't Doubt Dalton' earning an Honorable Mention in 2017, an Award of Merit in 2019, a Wister Medal in 2021, and AIS's highest award, the American Dykes Medal, in 2023.

#### About the American Iris Society

The mission of AIS is to organize and disseminate knowledge of the genus *Iris* and to foster its preservation, enjoyment, and continued development. The Society is welcoming to all people, regardless of race, religion, socioeconomic status, ethnic background, gender or sexual orientation. Members collaborate locally, regionally, and nationally to encourage the cultivation, enjoyment, and preservation of all irises. Activities often include educational programs, judges' training, exhibitions, and garden observation of irises in 15 horticultural iris classifications. # AIS REGION 15 SPRING TREK 2024 Guest Speaker: Douglas Kanarowski

Iris Hybridizer and Owner of Mariposa Iris, Mariposa, CA

Originally from Michigan, Doug met and married his wife to be in Mariposa, a small, sparsely-populated community on the edge of Yosemite National Park, California. Both gardeners from a very young age, Diane was the "flower person" while Doug's priority was growing all of the family fruits and vegetables. "They're pretty, but you can't eat them." But that is not how this story will end.

Around 1995, three pivotal events took place in fairly rapid succession. First, Diane got a bit overwhelmed with the upkeep of her flowers. As an act of kindness, Doug volunteered to help her with part of her flower work. So she delegated the



growing of her iris to him. Second, during one of their joint visits to Superstitions Iris Gardens, Rick Tasco showed him how to breed an iris. "At that moment, I felt like the recipient of the secret recipe for Coca-Cola." And clearly remember practically shouting out loud, "Do you have any idea of what you've just done?"

The third event occurred during a trip to the nursery of a world-renown, miniature rose breeder, Ralph Moore. Moore shared that of the hundreds of promising seedlings that he sees each year, he would only introduce a rose that was either 20% different or 20% better than what was already on the market. To Doug, that made perfect sense.



Doug is hyper-critical of his own seedlings and therefore only introduces an average of 3 iris per year. As an aid, he has designed his own seedling evaluation form that reminds him to evaluate more than 50 different aspects. While minor faults can be tolerated, a major fault will always result in a one-way trip to the compost pile. "My goal is to advance the iris world .... and to do this by only advancing the best of the best."

In 2010, he began marketing his Iris From The Future on his website: <u>www.mariposairis.com</u> He has initiated a number of industry leading innovations. Some of which are: a 100% satisfaction guarantee, 2 rhizomes for the price of one, and no shipping charges for orders over \$100.

He is semi-active in three iris societies, involved with Region 14 activities, active in iris judging, visits many area gardens and has conducted an annual, public, open-garden event for over 20 years. He also makes a research trip to all the major Oregon gardens every second year to keep abreast of future developments.

"I look at what they are working on, and then go home and work in different directions. From what I am seeing in my own seedlings beds and in the beds of others, the future of iris is far more interesting and exciting than we have imagined. The iris horizon isn't narrowing, it's actually widening!"
